


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
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
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From the Governor's Desk



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
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

- . Smoking is prohibited in a motor vehicle by the operator or a passenger when a person under 16 years of age is present. The fine is \$50.

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






This winter, experience more magical moments in Maine.



Come Play in Maine's Great Outdoors

There's nothing like a Maine vacation for outdoor fun! Spend some quality time on Maine's extensive coastal and inland waters. Try a guided sea kayaking expedition, a tranquil canoe trek around a lake, or a thrilling whitewater rafting trip. Hike or bike the mountain trails. Or pedal your way through the rolling countryside. Play 18 scenic holes of golf. Or explore Maine's interconnected ATV trails. Wildlife abounds, so be on the lookout for moose and eagles, whales and seals. Whatever recreational activity you choose, you're going to love Maine's recreational playground.

Hit the Trails. With over 1,000 miles of maintained hiking trails, you and your boots have plenty of places to explore. The Appalachian Trail is accessible from many points throughout the state, including Grafton Notch State Park, the Bigelow Preserve, and Baxter State Park, where you can hike to the summit of Mt. Katahdin, the northern terminus of the AT. The well-maintained paths of Acadia National Park reveal grand ocean views and are perennial favorites. The Mt. Agamenticus conservation region in York has an extensive shared-use trail system that is a natural draw for foot travelers. Many parks and public reserved lands, like Mt. Blue State Park and Cutler Coast, are popular for spectacular scenery.


Pick up a paddle. The canoe is a traditional mode of travel through the woods and waters of Maine. Kayaks have also become increasingly popular for freshwater use. Whatever craft you choose, Maine has a wealth of paddling oppor-

tunities. The **Northern Forest Canoe Trail** passes through Maine, giving canoe trekkers access to 347 miles of remote lakes and rivers. Guided trips on the **Allagash Wilderness Waterway** and **St. John River** are classic expeditions. The **Moose, Machias** and **St. Croix Rivers** offer leisurely paddling trips, with primitive campsites along the way.


Pedal a Bike. Maine and its rural byways, city streets and off-road trails are known for being bike-friendly. Cyclists can explore the beauty of the Sunrise County on 85 miles of the new **Downeast Sunrise Trail**. In the capital city of Augusta the **Kennebec River Rail Trail** is one of the most popular bike routes in the state. **Bradbury Mountain State Park** has miles of thrilling mountain biking on trails ranging from wide and easy to narrow and technical. Every summer bicyclists gather for the **Maine Bike Rally** – this year it's being held in Brunswick – for three fun days of organized rides.



Pick up a Maine State Parks Passport at one of our state parks or historic sites and begin a journey of discovery. The Passport serves as your guide to Maine's amazing natural treasures, providing information about 48 different parks and historic sites, plus an incentive to really get out and explore more. Collect stamps at each park facility and qualify for rewards—the more stamps you collect, the more cool stuff you get along the way.

Run the Rivers. Maine is home to three world-class rafting rivers and more than a dozen outfitters offering the best guided rafting excitement in the East. There's something for everyone, from family float trips to thundering whitewater runs, plus riverside barbeques and cozy lodging. The **Penobscot River** has 12 miles of foaming rapids, including Exterminator, the Crib Works, and Nesowadnehunk Falls. Rafters on the **Kennebec River** will encounter the fun of Big Mama, Whitewasher and Magic Falls. And the **Dead River** offers 16 miles of nearly continuous whitewater, starting at Spencer Rips and finishing with a big splash at Lower Poplar Falls.

Watch for Wildlife. Found throughout the state, the venerable moose is Maine's most recognizable outdoor resident. For moose sightings take a guided **moose safari** and let a woods-wise expert lead you to the best viewing spots. Guided **puffin watch** cruises will take you to the remote offshore islands where the colorful Atlantic Puffin, with its clownish beak

and comical ways, live in large colonies. And whale watch excursions depart from many ports along the coast. Follow the Maine Birding Trail to over 260 accessible sites where 330 bird species call Maine home for part or all of the year.

Get in the Swing. With more than 140 golf courses around Maine golfers have plenty of choices to match their budget, ability and style of play. Along the **Maine Golf Trail** you can play a friendly beginner course or test your mettle on the challenging links laid out by a world-class designer. Enjoy a leisurely 18 holes at historic **Poland Spring Country Club**, one of the oldest courses in the country, or tee off amid stunning mountain views at the championship **Sugarloaf Golf Club**. Wherever you choose to play – the variety is astounding – you're sure to enjoy a memorable round of golf.


Go ATVing. Over 6,000 miles of ATV trails give riders many options for motorized recreation with plenty of places to explore, get wet and dirty and have good fun. The Maine Highlands region is a hub of **ATV riding** activity, with a vast network of maintained trails connecting **Greenville** and **Guilford** to **Bingham**, **The Forks** and **Jackman**. These ATV-friendly towns provide the services to keep you going, like gas, groceries, restaurants and lodging. The annual **ATV Jamboree** in late summer draws riders from both sides of the border for a weekend of guided trail rides, races and mud riding.

Insider's Guide to Maine Parks & Beaches

Maine's outstanding scenic beauty is a natural treasure. Over a million acres of recreation lands capture the best of this amazing landscape of seashore, mountains and hills, lakes and rivers, salt marshes and bottomland, woods and fields, and the largest undeveloped swath of forestland remaining in the East. Beaches, state parks, nature preserves and public lands are a great place to start your Maine adventure, offering outdoor enthusiasts of all interests and abilities endless opportunities for year-round fun. The following is a sampling of the many different natural places that are open to the public in Maine's eight regions.



Kennebec & Moose River Valleys


Visit the Kennebec & Moose River Valleys region and paddle your canoe through the wilderness waters of Attean Pond in the Holeb public reserved land. Ride your bicycle on the historic Solon-Bingham Multi-Use Trail, a scenic old logging railroad bed along the Kennebec River. Lace up your boots and hike the Appalachian Trail to the craggy summit of Pleasant Pond Mountain for great views of the north woods. Travel back in time at Fort Halifax, a colonial outpost built by early English settlers and the oldest remaining blockhouse in the U.S.

Mid-Coast

Reid State Park in the Mid-Coast region is a popular spot for sunbathing, swimming, watching shorebirds and saltwater fishing. Follow the trails of Frve Mountain Wildlife Management Area near Belfast where deer and other small mammals abound in the upland forests and old farmlands. The Whaleback Shell Midden on the Damariscotta River will amaze you with its enormous thirtyfoot deep pile of oyster shells discarded by Native Americans over a thousand-year period. Walk the quiet paths of Fernald's Neck Preserve along the pristine shores of Lake Megunticook in the Camden Hills.

Maine's Lakes & Mountains


The wide sandy beach and grassy promenade of Range Ponds
State Park in Maine's Lakes and Mountains region are great for a leisurely day of swimming and picnicking. The Grafton Loop Trail traverses the mountainous terrain of the Mahoosuc public reserved land, providing day and overnight hiking. Bickford Slides in the Caribou-Speckled Mountain Wilderness of the White Mountain National

Forest is a 90-foot series of cascades and a swimming hole accessed by an easy hike. Stroll through the woods along the placid Saco River at the Hiram Nature Study Area.

Greater Portland & Casco Bay

Just northwest of Portland, the miles of dedicated single-track trails of Bradbury Mountain State Park are a mountain biker's paradise. Take to the winding nature paths of Portland's Baxter Woods, perfect for a brief escape from the busy urban environs. Find your place in the sun at Scarborough Beach State Park stretching for over a mile on Casco Bay, or surf the waves at nearby **Higgins Beach**. Explore the farmland and forests of Pineland public reserved land, the home to wild turkeys and other birdlife.

The Maine Beaches

In a region known for its 30mile expanse of dazzling white sand, there is no shortage of spectacular beaches from which to choose. Enjoy the sand and surf, as well as the restaurants and entertainment, in classic beachfront communities, from Kittery to Old Orchard Beach. Laudholm Farm is home to the Wells National Estuarine Research Reserve, Drake's Island Beach and seven miles of kidfriendly trails. For bird watching, flock to East Point Sanctuary with views of Biddeford Pool and Wood Island Light. Historic Fort McClary on Kittery Point has occupied its important coastal location since 1689.

Aroostook County

In Aroostook County, climb the trails on Deboullie Mountain to the old fire tower, and fish for brook trout and landlocked salmon in the ponds of **Deboullie** public reserve land. Hike a section of the **International Appalachian**

Trail to the summit ridge of Mars Hill, site of the whirling turbines of Maine's first commercial wind energy project. Plan a canoe trip to Maine's first state park, **Aroostook State Park**, encompassing Echo Lake and Quaggy Jo Mountain.

The Maine Highlands - Bangor • Katahdin • Moosehead Lake

The **Katahdin Iron Works—Roach Pond Tract** is a 63,000-acre property owned by the Appalachian Mountain Club in the heart of the Maine Highlands region, where visitors can hike and fish by day and stay overnight in cozy log cabins. The lakes and mountains of the **Nahmakanta** public reserved land offer unspoiled and crowd-free boating, hiking and camping. Sunning and swimming at the sand beach at **Peaks-Kenny State Park** is a relaxing way to enjoy the beauty of Sebec Lake.

DownEast & Acadia

The **Downeast Sunrise Trail** is the newest edition to the recreation scene in the DownEast & Acadia region, providing walkers, cyclists, ATVers and snowmobilers with 85 miles of outdoor fun along an abandoned railroad corridor. The Schoodic Peninsula of **Acadia National Park** is dominated by Schoodic Head, where a short hike rewards with panoramic views of Frenchmen's Bay. At **Donnell Pond** public reserved land, launch a motorboat for a scenic tour of **Tunk Lake**, a favorite spot for lake trout fishing. **Lamoine State Park** is a popular place for sea kayakers wanting to explore the narrows along Mount Desert Island.

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Of Brookies and Bass and Grandsons. The 14-inch wild native brook trout took the first dry fly offered when I arrived at my favorite pool about a mile from the road in this cold free flowing north woods stream. The trout's stunning spawning colors erased any doubt that there is a God.

In recent years, Maine has stepped up protection of its native brookies, important when you understand that this state has 97 percent of all the remaining native book trout in the United States.

Wading downstream to my favorite pool holding hundreds of spawning trout (I caught more than 50 in two hours), I'd been forced out of the stream at one point when three large river otters took a disliking to my presence.

They were more aggressive than the cow moose and calf I'd walked around at the point I entered the stream.

Not long before I'd driven to camp to enjoy this fall fishing experience, I'd taken my grandson to a favorite pond near my Mount Vernon home, just 20 miles from the State Capitol, to fish for smallmouth bass.

Six-year-old Addison sat in the front seat of the old aluminum canoe and cast a jig toward shore, working it back as skillfully as a professional bass angler, while his grandfather watched with a mixture of love, pride, and anticipation.

There! An eager bass grabbed the jig, Addi lifted the rod, the fish was on, the fish was up and out of the water!

"That's a huge fish Addison!" I exclaimed. And his smile told me that the public purchase of the land surrounding this pond in the Kennebec Highlands was a very wise decision.

Maine added two million acres in the last decade to its public lands inventory to make sure all of us have access to this state's amazing natural resources.

As a river angler, I've been blessed to fish magnificent rivers from Alaska to Montana to Ouebec and Labrador. Maine's rivers are equally spectacular.

In July, I slipped my kayak into the Kennebec River just 15 miles above the capitol city of Augusta. The 47 smallmouth bass caught that morning were memorable, as were the two dozen Bald Eagles along the river.

Most astonishing – I didn't see another person! And this section of the river is so undeveloped you'd think you're in the Alaskan bush.

Waters all over the state draw my attention year-round, yet I remain true to my roots. Nothing pleases me more than a day on a small brook, catching brook trout. My first fishing experiences involved dunking worms into tiny brooks. Today I prefer to cast flies.

My favorite brook regularly gives up as many as 100 brookies in a half-day of fishing. Except for that day I waded a mile down the brook and got mixed up with a pair of mating bears. That called for a hasty retreat!

No need to retreat if you're thinking of fishing here.







Who can raft?

Anyone who enjoys the outdoors and is looking for adventure can raft. You need not be a fitness fanatic or an Olympic Athlete. Maine rafts typically hold an eight person crew and a guide. To protect the environmental quality of Maine's rivers, the State limits the number of rafters each day.

What is included?

Outfitters provide transportation to and from their base facility to the rivers, life preservers, helmets and paddles, a pre-trip orientation and safety meeting, a ride down the river and a hearty, open grill meal. Most outfitters provide a slide or video show of your trip down the river at an "a près-trip" party at base camp.

How much does it cost?

Prices for river trips vary based on the month, day of the week and number of people in your party. A one day trip on the Kennebec typically ranges from \$80 to \$120 per person. A day trip on the Penobscot \$90 to \$130 per person and on the Dead \$90 to \$140 per person. Packages including lodging or camping and other wilderness activities are available and each outfitter offers group rates.

When can we go rafting?

The season on the Penobscot and Kennebec begins in late April and ends in mid October. Controlled daily dam releases from hydropower dams on these rivers guarantee water levels throughout the season, even during the driest summers. There are seven high water releases of over 5,000 cfs on the Dead River in the Spring and Fall. Kennebec River Turbine Tests of 8,000 cfs are scheduled four times throughout the season.







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Maine's Climate

MAINE ENJOYS a healthy, invigorating climate. Its overall weather conditions are a valuable asset to the state in that good air quality and moderate temperatures are conducive to productive labor and a principal factor in Maine's four-season vacation/travel industry.


Climatological Division. Maine is divided into three climatological divisions: Coastal, Southern Interior, and Northern Interior. The Coastal Division, which extends for about twenty miles inland along the length of the coast, is tempered by the ocean, resulting in lower summer and higher winter temperatures than are typical of interior zones. The Southern Interior Division extends in a longitudinal belt across the southern portion of the State, and encompasses about 30% of Maine's total area. The Northern Interior Division occupies nearly 60% of the State's area and has a continental climate It is furthest from the ocean and contains the highest elevations.

Temperatures. Maine has one of the most comfortable statewide summer climates in the continental United States. Peak temperatures, normally occurring in July, average about 70°F throughout the State. In the Southern Interior Division during a very warm summer, temperatures may reach 90° for as many as 25 days, and in the Coastal Division, two to seven days. Summer nights are usually comfortably cool. Winters are generally cold, but very prolonged cold spells are rare. Northern Interior weather stations may record as many as 40 to 60 days of sub-zero temperatures annually, while

coastal stations report 10 to 20 sub-zero days per year.

Precipitation. Annual precipitation in Maine averages 40 inches in the Northern Division, about 42 inches in the South and 46 inches in the Coastal Division. Although Maine is rarely subjected to ice storms, hurricanes and tornadoes, 10 to 20 thunderstorms occur annually in the Coastal Division and 15 to 30 elsewhere. Heavy ground fogs often appear in lowlying inland areas, but occur most frequently along the coast, for 25 to 60 days annually. The southern portion has 80 to 120 clear days per year when there is no fog or other precipitation, and northern regions somewhat less. The percentage of possible sunshine varies from 50% in Eastport to about 60% in Portland.

Average annual snowfall in Maine is 50 to 70 inches in the Coastal Division, 60 to 90 inches in the Southern Interior and 90 to 110 inches in the Northern Interior. The Coastal Division rarely has more than 15 to 20 days annually with snowfall of one inch or more, although a "Northeaster" may occasionally drop 10 or more inches of snow in a single day. The Northern Interior may have up to 30 days a year with a minimum of one inch. January is normally the snowiest month, with an average of about 20 inches.

Of course, almost everyone is thrilled to have lobster from Maine. It's always a surprise to people because the vibrant complex flavors contrast so well with the richness of the lobster. Over the years we've been quietly involved with promoting sustainability of our oceans. We work frequently with the Monterey Bay Aquarium, The Smithsonian Museum, and The Maine Lobster Council to promote a healthier marine environment. And we are very proud of the fact that Maine has always been on the forefront of protecting its fisheries. In fact the first regulations designed to protect our lobsters were implemented in the 1880s!

We always enjoy cooking with lobsters and over the last two decades we've had the privilege of meeting many of the lobster men and women who go out in all sorts of weather and adverse conditions to bring us this delicacy—fresh off the boat. And when the lobsters are cooked they have the most pure flavor.

The Classic Shack Experience

Still, you may want to start with the classic shack experience. Up and down the coast are countless weathered lobster shacks and casual eateries where a meal of fresh lobster, clams and other seafood, served on paper plates at picnic tables, is a time-honored tradition.

The lobster pound may be right next door. You can buy your lobsters and take

them home—often they'll even steam them for you.

From bibs to crackers to melted butter, eating Maine lobster is a ritual like no other. On most menus you'll find the lobster "shore dinner," which usually includes at least red potatoes, fresh, Maine-grown cornon-the-cob and often clams, boiled in the same salty water as your lobster and embellished with even more melted butter.

You'll find quintessential Maine lobster shacks everywhere you go, such as **Bagaduce Lunch** in Brooksville, winner of a coveted James Beard "American Classic" Award. Other classic shacks up and down the coast include **Barnacle Billy's** and the **Ogunquit Lobster Pound**, both in Ogunquit; **Allen's Seafood and Takeout** in Harpswell; **Red's Eats** in Wiscasset, **Five Islands Lobster Company** in Georgetown, and **Docksider** in Northeast Harbor. The Traditional Maine Lobster Bake

The Lobster Bake is another favorite tradition. Whether you do it yourself, or find one of Maine's many lobster bake companies to do it for you, it's an event made for the shore. In addition to lobsters, clams and mussels, corn on the cob, potatoes and sometimes even smoked Kielbasa, a key player is seaweed, layered between each ingredient, and lending a salty freshness to the meal. 

The work of traditional folk artists, artisans and craftspeople is being preserved through apprenticeships, dedicated mentors, and support from communities throughout the state. A showcase for Maine's natural resources, materials and creativity, Maine made products offer a chance to give—or keep for yourself—an authentic piece of Maine.

Maine Inspired

Creativity & Craft

From Native American baskets to farmmade soaps, fine stoneware to jewelry made with tourmaline and seaglass, Maine offers up a rich landscape of handcrafted treasures and one-of-a-kind products. In a show of sustainable ingenuity, Portland's **Sea Bags** fashions custom tote bags from recycled sails, while others craft reclaimed barn boards, lobster traps, rope and gourds into home goods and conversation pieces. Glass blowers display their skills in numerous studios and shops, and you don't have to look far for Maine's acclaimed pottery. Start with **Potter's House** in Litchfield, **Maine's Potters' Market** in Portland, or **Edgecomb Potters** gallery and studio in Edgecomb.

Fiber artists, spinners and weavers make up another vital community. Cherished gifts of unmatched quality can be found at retail spots like Kingfield's Mainely Alpaca, where alpaca fur is transformed into sweaters and heirloom blankets. In Aroostook County, artisan craftspeople united to form the Made in Aroostook cooperative. Everything from metalwork and woodcrafts to artisan foods, snowshoes, photography and herbal remedies are available through their website and in local outlets like Deep in the Woods Gift Shop of Oxbow Plantation or Knot II Bragg Farm in Wade. Throughout the DownEast & Acadia region, and elsewhere in Maine, artisans sell handcrafted Balsam wreaths, centerpieces and Christmas trees locally and around the country.

In addition to Maine-inspired brands with national reputations — names such as L.L.Bean, Tom's of Maine, Thos. Moser, angela adams, Old Town Canoe, Jill McGowan and Lovell Designs — keep your eyes peeled for the many up-and-coming designers in Maine who produce everything from custom high-heels to art lamps, cat toys to Adirondack chairs. A rich sampling of merchandise exclusively from local craftspeople populates stores and craft centers, including Lisa Marie's Made in Maine in Bath and Portland, United Maine Craftsmen in Manchester, the gallery and folk arts school Top



of Maine Wood Carvers in Limestone, Maine Crafts Guild in Westport Island, and the Center for Maine Craft in West Gardiner.

Gourmet Spirit

Maine's gourmet food and spirits producers frequently take advantage of the state's indigenous offerings. Maine Mead Works, for example, uses 100% Maine wildflower honey, while Cold River Vodka proudly utilizes Maine's potato harvest. Cellardoor Winery grows grapes particularly suited to Maine's climate; and Big Claw wine is designed to pair with Maine lobster—and a portion of the proceeds goes back to the lobster industry. Green Bee All-Natural Soda sweetens its brew with Maine honey, while South Casco's Blacksmith's Winery and Kennebec Cider Company use locally grown fruit.

The One Stop Shop for Maine Crafts

Q&A with Dr. Tracy S. Michaud Stutzman, Executive Director, Center for Maine Craft.

What is the Center for Maine Craft?

The Center is run by the Maine Crafts Association, a 25-year-old non-profit organization that helps Maine artists make a living at their craft. The Center has ongoing exhibitions of fine craft art, live artists demonstrating regularly, tourism information, and artist referral services, as well as the best selection of handmade Maine craftwork for sale.

What will visitors find at the Center?

Handcrafted works of the highest quality, from over 350 juried artists, are on display and for sale. There is a huge variety, at varying prices, including pottery, glass, wood, jewelry, and metal utensils, t-shirts, fiber wearables and bags, children's toys, books, prints, cards, packaged foods (for humans and pets), and bath products.

What should buyers know about the treasures they are taking home?

With every purchase at the Center, visitors are taking home a special piece of Maine, supporting artists, and helping the MCA continue to preserve and encourage Maine craft.

The Center for Maine Craft showroom is located at the West Gardiner Service Plaza off I-295 and I-95 /Maine Turnpike.

Microbreweries flourish here (Maine ranks fourth in the nation for the number of breweries per capita), as do artisan chocolatiers like **Black Dinah**, **Dean's Sweets**, and **Cacao Chocolates**. You'll also find a delicious abundance of syrup makers, honey makers, saltwater taffy makers, whoopie pie bakers and producers of jams and jellies, including **Nervous Nellie's** and **Stonewall Kitchen**. Further culinary exploration will reveal such edible treasures as **Oyster Creek Mushroom Company** and **DownEast Whelks**, which produces pickled "wrinkles" – a distinctive sea trinket with the flavor of a clam.

A Diverse Shopping Landscape

Whether the shopping urge leads you to the outlets of **Kittery**, **Freeport** or **Ellsworth**, to bustling malls in **South Portland** or **Lewiston/Auburn**, or to historic downtown shopping districts in **Portland**, **Bangor**, **Ogunquit** and the **Kennebunks**, there is something for everyone here. Art galleries and museums, such as the **Portland Museum of Art** or the **Farnsworth Art Museum** in Rockland, present distinctive shopping opportunities as well, and a chance to commemorate the trip with a piece of Maine's art legacy. If you long for more challenging shopping terrain, Maine is antiquing central. It's common to find antiques in traditional settings such as turn-of-the-century barns, taverns, and historic houses as you travel Route 1 or explore off the beaten track. Brunswick's **Fort Andross** boasts antique treasures alongside a multi-dealer flea market—no dedicated shopping day required.



Sailing along the Maine coast aboard a windjammer is an adventure ruled by wind and influenced by tide. Named for their ability to "jam" into the wind, windjammer cruises allow guests to disconnect from technology and savor the riches of family and friends. It's an experience that provides a close-up view of lobstermen hauling traps and seals sunning on ledges, winking lighthouses and clanging bell buoys, offshore islands and remote fishing villages.

Cruising through history

Seventy-five years ago, Frank Swift, an enterprising sea captain restored and retrofitted an old cargo schooner, then invited paying customers aboard to sail the Maine coast. Now, a dozen vessels are members of the Maine Windjammer Association, the oldest working fleet under sail in North America. Most are floating living-history museums, listed on the National Historic Register; some are new, purpose-built to carry passengers. They range in length from the intimate, 46-foot Mistress to the 132-foot, three-masted Victory Chimes, the largest sailing vessel under the U.S. flag; in age from the Lewis R. French, built in Camden in 1871, to the Heritage, built in Rockland in 1983. All homeport in Rockland or Camden, and all deliver an authentic experience, transporting guests not only along the Maine coast, but also back in time to the Great Age of Sail.

Where exhilaration meets relaxation

One of the ironies of windjamming is that there's nothing to do, yet so much to be done. Some guests lounge on the deck, perhaps reading; others chat, cementing new friendships; a few scan the horizon with binoculars or cameras; and nearly everyone keeps an eye out for whales spouting, seals swimming, and other windjammers skimming across the ocean waters. The freedom from technology is liberating, the quiet soothing, the pace exhilarating, even when the wind barely whispers.

Clocks are of no use aboard a Maine windjammer; time is measured meal to meal, and days are measured in relation to the lobster feed, a highlight of every cruise. The aromas of bread baking, chowder simmering, dinner cooking waft from the galley, carried along on the same salt-laden breeze that fills the sails. The choral chores of raising and lowering the sails (also known as schooner aerobics or the armstrong method of sailing) keep appetites healthy, but one never goes hungry on a windjammer...sniff, sniff... brownies!

Windjammers sail by day, but at night, they cozy into a harbor and drop anchor, often ferrying passengers ashore to hike on a sprucecovered island, treasure hunt in ledge-cosseted tidepools, or poke about a genuine fishing village.

Sunsets are almost magical when viewed from a windjammer deck, and on a clear, moonlit night, the stargazing can be spectacular. Often captain, crew and guests will trade stories and share songs into the night. Slumber usually comes quickly, hastened by fresh salt air and encouraged by the rhythmic, gentle lapping of waves against the hull.

For 75 years, Maine's growing fleet of traditional windjammers has been offering guests a chance to get off the beaten path and explore anchorages ranging from bustling seaside communities to uninhabited islands and small fishing villages. From May to October, these 19th-century sailing ships provide three- to six-day trips that transport guests back to the golden age of sail where deadlines and itineraries take a back seat o relaxation and beauty. Together, they represent the untry's largest fleet of historic sailing ships.

To celebrate this historic 75th anniversary, the fleet will host numerous celebrations during the 2011 season including races, raft-ups and rendezvous. Romance and Industry:



Maine is an intrinsically maritime state with thousands of miles of coastline. thousands of islands, countless lakes, wide navigable rivers, protected harbors, and a rich tradition of boat building that dates back to pre-colonial times. This maritime culture runs deep and visitors can experience the history as well as a thriving maritime economy in ways that exist

nowhere else.

Boat building and shipbuilding

Historically, more wooden ships were built in Maine in the 19th century than in any other state. This industry is still an important part of Maine's culture and economy. Visitors can participate by taking boat-building classes at the Apprentice Shop in Rockland and the Wooden Boat School in Brooklin, among others. By arrangement with Maine Maritime Museum, tours are available of Bath Iron Works, where destroyers are built for the U.S. Navy, Washburn and Doughty, where tugs are built that work in harbors worldwide, and high-end recreational boat yards like Hodgdon Yachts. See why many people consider Maine-built boats to be the best in the world at Round Pond Harbor where an astounding number of traditional boats are moored for the summer.

Working Waterfront

Maine is among the few states where visitors can experience a working waterfront as an integral part of the community. Fisherman repair their nets in the heart of **Portland's Old Port**, fish and lobster are landed at **Holbrook's Wharf** in **Harpswell** and in **Port Clyde**, the mail boat that delivers mail and supplies to the calendar islands of Casco Bay welcomes passengers aboard. And, of course, the waters of Maine wouldn't look the same without the colorful lobster buoys bobbing on the surface.

Lighthouses and Forts

Maine has more than 60 lighthouses and many are national symbols such as **West Quoddy Head Light** at the easternmost point of the United States and **Pemaquid Light** featured on the Maine quarter. Several of them are accessible by land or by water on cruise boats or schooner trips. The importance of Maine's coastal economy can also be seen in the number of fortifications that were built from Kittery to Eastport during the colonial period and updated to serve as coastal defenses in WWI and WWII and are now accessible to visitors.


Maritime Arts

The maritime heritage of Maine influences nearly every aspect of life along the coast and this can be experienced through the art and music created here. Maine Maritime Museum in Bath and the Penobscot Marine Museum in Searsport present world-class collections of historic and contemporary maritime treasures. The Farnsworth Museum in Rockland, the Portland Museum of Art, and the Maine Historical Society show the impact of our maritime heritage on artists, writers, poets, and craftspeople. Traditional sea music festivals abound and contemporary musicians continue to find inspiration in coastal living.

Getting on the water

Many will say that the best way to experience Maine is from the water. For those who own a boat, the **Maine Island Trails Association** offers access to private islands and suggests safe harbors. Kayaks can be rented by the hour or the day to explore lakes, rivers, and the coast. Experience island life by taking a ferry ride to **Monhegan Island**, or sail on a schooner in **Camden**, **Rockland**, **Boothbay Harbor**, **Bar Harbor**, **Eastport** or **Portland**.







On the Trail of Great Art

The Maine Art Museum Trail is one route to follow, offering seven museums conveniently located within a day's drive of each other. The fine art aficionado will find world-class paintings, photography, sculpture, prints and other objects housed in architecturally notable venues. The art fare ranges from Abyssinian reliefs at the Bowdoin College Museum of Art to the prints of James McNeil Whistler at the Colby College Museum of Art to a wall-size canvas by the contemporary German painter Anselm Kieffer at the Portland Museum of Art.

Every period of American art, from the Hudson River School to cutting-edge installations, is represented on the Maine Art Museum Trail. Of course, there is a special focus on artists associated with Maine, with many of the masters of the past two centuries counted among them. The Bates College Museum of Art often showcases its collection of Lewiston native and American Modernist Marsden Hartley while the Ogunquit Museum of American Art draws on the remarkable roster of artists who have frequented its famed colony, from Charles Woodbury to Beverly Hallam. The Wyeth family stars at the Farnsworth Art Museum in Rockland. The University of Maine Museum of Art in Bangor has a reputation for mounting the very best in Maine photography, from Berenice Abbott to contemporary

masters. In addition to highlighting work from their permanent collections, the seven museums host outstanding traveling exhibitions, including loan shows from fellow New England institutions.

Art Adventures

To add some travel adventure to the mix, consider visiting some of the state's more far-flung venues. **The Monhegan Museum of Art**, perched atop Lighthouse Hill, highlights the extraordinary heritage of one of Maine's most remote islands, inspiration for generations of artists, including Rockwell Kent, George Bellows and Edward Hopper. Farther downeast, the **Tides Institute and Museum of Art** in Eastport is dedicated to showcasing the artists of the region, including maritime Canada.

Heading inland, the visitor will find a wealth of out-ofthe-ordinary offerings. In the western part of the state, the Rangeley Lakes Region Logging Museum presents the history of a Maine livelihood through displays, including Alden Grant's remarkable cycle of paintings depicting life in the logging camps. The L.C. Bates Museum in Hinckley mounts exhibitions related to the region as well as to its remarkable natural history collection, often inviting artists to interpret its holdings.

Outside Art

Renowned Maine art critic Carl Little offers suggestions on where to find public art as you travel around Maine.

Wending your way through Maine, keep an eye out for public sculpture. Maine boasts a bounty of "outside art," from **Bernard Langlais's** towering Indian in **Skowhegan** to **Celeste Roberge's** steel-strapped beachstone orb at the Jackson Laboratories in **Bar Harbor**.

According to the Maine Center for Creativity, the **Sprague Energy tank farm** in **South Portland** is the world's largest public art painting. **Jaime Gili**, a Venezuelan artist, won the **Art All Around** international design competition to paint 16 oil storage tanks.

Many libraries, schools and businesses feature sculpture commissioned through the Maine Arts Commission's Percent for Art program. Wade Kavanaugh's ingeniously sited picnic tables at Peaks-Kenny State Park on Sebec Lake are a recent Percent project.


This summer, the third annual Schoodic International Sculpture Symposium will bring national and international sculptors to DownEast Maine to create original works from native granite. Visitors are welcome to watch the chips fly and view the finished sculptures from past summers installed in area villages.

Last but not least, enjoy sculpture and flowers at the **Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens** in **Boothbay**. This splendid venue is one of the finest spots to view art outside.



Whatever direction you take during your Maine travels, art awaits. From city to village, from museum to coffee shop, from roadside to inside—at every turn, the visuals are there. The art road beckons.

... More to Discover



The visitor should expect to be surprised, by a multimedia display at the Institute of Contemporary Art at the Maine College of Art (ICA at MECA for short) in Portland or an exciting young artist debuting at the Center for Maine Contemporary Art in Rockport. You might encounter an exhibition of Stephen Pace's bold canvases at Fryeburg Academy's new arts center or an exhibition of Andy Warhol's photographs at the Reid Gallery at the University of Maine at Presque Isle. The annual invitational sculpture show at the University of New England Art Gallery or examples of the latest photography on display at the Maine Media Workshops in Rockport might catch the traveler's eye.

State of the Arts

Maine art venues have collaborated on a number of statewide projects to highlight a particular medium, including prints and fabric. This year, more than 20 of Maine's fine



Alpine Skiing

During February, the site hosts the U.S. National Toboggan Championships, an adrenaline-filled weekend that includes sledding competitions, food, music and fun for the whole family. Open to the public, you can enter your own toboggan team into the races or simply cheer on the wild riders from slopeside. Rent a toboggan or bring your own and enjoy a thrilling ride down the icy chute out onto Hosmer Pond, where you'll travel up to a quarter mile before slowing to a stop. A true winter thrill. 

Brunswick, home to Bowdoin College, is Maine's oldest college town. Browse the many shops, restaurants and galleries along Maine Street and visit the outstanding Bowdoin College Museum of Art. Catch music on the mall Wednesday evenings during the summer. And hop on the Androscoggin River Bike Path.

Bath is the perfect place to explore the region's boatbuilding heritage. Visit the **Maine Maritime Museum**. See what's happening at the **Chocolate Church Arts Center**. And head down the **Phippsburg Peninsula** to spectacular **Popham Beach** and historic **Fort Popham**.

Arrowsic and **Georgetown** are picturesque villages along Route 127 where you'll find scenic salt marshes, art galleries and pottery studios. Picnic at **Reid State Park**, with sweeping views of islands and lighthouses. Stop for fresh-caught Maine lobster at **Five Islands**.

Boothbay Harbor is a popular tourist destination and a great place for **kayaking**, **whale watching**, **sport fishing** or **puffin tours**. Stay in a cottage along the shore and make a day trip to the **Boothbay Railway Village** or the magnificent **Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens**.

In **Damariscotta** and **Newcastle**, you'll find 19th century storefronts filled with shops, restaurants and galleries. Check out the events (and ice cream) at **Round Top Center for the Arts**, taste world-class locally cultivated **oysters** and discover enormous prehistoric **shell mounds**.

Rockland's lively arts and culture scene includes the world-class collections at the Farnsworth Art Museum and the Wyeth Center. Stop by the Puffin Project Visitor Center and Maine Lighthouse Museum. Ferry out to Vinalhaven, North Haven or Matinicus. Discover award-winning restaurants.

Camden is a classic harbor town, filled with quaint inns and B&Bs and framed by the magnificent **Camden Hills**. Hike or drive up **Mt. Battie** and then relax in a harborside pub overlooking **windjammers** and fishing boats. Make a side trip to the charming arts community of **Rockport**.

In **Belfast**, stroll along the harbor from **Heritage Park**; encounter interactive street sculptures, art galleries, boutiques, restaurants and historic homes. Take an afternoon cruise on the **Friendship Sloop Amity**. In nearby **Searsport**, visit the **Penobscot Marine Museum**.

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


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Maine's Mid-Coast islands can cast a spell, captivating visitors with their expansive views and relaxed pace. Intoxicating fragrances of pine and wild roses permeate the salt-laden air; raspberries and blackberries flourish in seaside meadows; the surf pounds the shore like a mesmerizing mantra.

Hundreds of islands dot the waters from northern Casco Bay through Muscongus Bay and into the famed sailing waters of Penobscot Bay. Hardy souls follow the Maine Island Trail, kayaking or sailing to remote islands to camp, picnic or just explore. Other islands are accessible by ferry or excursion boat and easily explored on foot or by bicycle. These are perfect for a day trip or an overnight: Just be sure to make lodging reservations in advance, as accommodations are limited. A few islands, like Orrs, Bailey, Southport and Westport, are connected to the mainland by bridge, allowing you a taste of island life without boarding a boat.

The Maine State Ferry Service operates several daily trips to Vinalhaven and North Haven from its Rockland terminal as well as occasional trips to distant Matinicus. All three are easily explored on foot or bicycle. It's a 10-minute walk from the Vinalhaven dock to Carvers Harbor, the island's busy village, where you can pick up an island map at one of the shops or restaurants, then set out for a picnic on Lane's Island Preserve. Visit the Historical Society Museum to learn about the island's rich granite quarrying and carving history. Bicyclists can make an easy loop around the southern part of the

island, perhaps stopping for a swim at either Booth's or Lawson's Quarry, to hike Isle-Au-Haut Mountain or for a picnic at State Beach. North Haven is much more quiet and exclusive. Matinicus is favored by bird-watchers.

Islesboro, a 20-minute ferry ride from Lincolnville Beach, requires a car or bicycle. Begin at the Sailor's Memorial Museum, just off the ferry dock at the base of Grindle Point Light, then head south through Dark Harbor, a summer colony, where magnificent waterfront mansions can be glimpsed through the trees. Have a picnic on the beach at Pendleton Point, then head north toward Pripet Harbor, where most of the island's year-round residents live. On the way, visit the Islesboro Historical Society.

Monhegan, 510 acres of rugged independence and spectacular scenery, is accessible by passenger boats from Port Clyde, New Harbor and Boothbay Harbor. Many artists, including the Wyeths, Rockwell Kent and George Bellows, have recorded Monhegan's dramatic vistas—surf exploding on jagged cliffs, fish houses perched on the village shore, towering evergreens in Cathedral Woods, and the lighthouse, which greets all comers with a friendly wink. The keeper's and assistant keeper's houses are now museums, one dedicated to Monhegan art, the other to the island's history, flora and fauna. Wander the 17 miles of trails, see artists at work, watch for birds and drink in the beauty.

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
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
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
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






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
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
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






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


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





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


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












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


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



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


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


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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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Insider's Guide

Lewiston and Auburn, twin cities on either side of the Androscoggin River, form a lively arts community. Learn about Maine's manufacturing heritage at Museum L/A: visit the Bates College Museum of Art; and take a walk through Thorncrag, New England's largest private bird sanctuary.

Naples, with its bustling lakeside Causeway, is a recreational hub. Bring the kids to Sebago Lake State Park. Cruise Long Lake on the Songo River Queen II, a replica of a Mississippi Paddle Wheeler; go antiquing in nearby Bridgton. Hike, bike or ski the trails at Shawnee Peak.

In Fryeburg, you'll find 11 buildings on the National Historic Register. Canoe or kayak the Saco River. Vacation on nearby Kezar Lake. And discover one of Maine's most scenic drives along Route 113 through Evans Notch, with views of the White Mountains.

Bethel offers four-season activities, from golfing, hiking, fishing and biking to skiing at nearby Sunday River and Mt. Abram Resorts. Paddle the Androscoggin River. Explore Grafton Notch State Park with short walks to Screw Auger Falls, Mother Walker Falls and Moose Cave. Take in a concert on the Bethel Commons and visit the Artist's Covered Bridge in Newry.

In the River Valley town of Rumford, you'll find dramatic Pennacook Falls, Maine's longest drop at 180 feet. Visit Lovejoy Covered Bridge in Andover. In winter, don't miss Black Mountain, one of Maine's finest family winter sports facilities.

Rangeley Lakes National Scenic Byway along Route 17 takes you to the Height of Land with its panorama of mountains, forests and the Rangeley Lakes. This is recreation central: sport fishing, hiking, canoeing, snowmobiling, skiing at Saddleback, and spectacular fall foliage.

Between Eustis and Kingfield, the beautiful Carrabassett **River** winds its way through the mountains. Fish in Flagstaff Lake. Go snowmobiling in Eustis. Hike the majestic Bigelow Range. Hit the trails or golf course at Sugarloaf ski resort in Carrabassett Valley.

Farmington, home of the University of Maine Farmington, is a lively college town. Check out the fascinating artifacts at the Nordica Homestead. Explore Mount Blue State Park in Weld, where you can swim in Webb Lake or pan for gold on the Swift River.

Rangeley was selected as one of America's Best Summer Lake Towns of 2010, by Budget Travel online magazine. Bethel has been named #2 Foliage Town in New England by Yankee Magazine.

Portland's Waterfront bustles with activity, as it has for centuries. Walking trails, trolley tours, scenic bay cruises, lobster boat rides, historic schooners and island ferries all start here! Enjoy the many pubs and seafood restaurants. And walk the **Eastern Prom Trail** for stunning bay views.

The Old Port is a lively shopping district with cobblestone streets, boutiques, galleries and restaurants in renovated Federal style buildings. Stroll up Exchange Street, then head toward Monument Square for seasonal Farmers' Markets and the childhood home of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow.

The Arts District, anchored by Portland Museum of Art, is filled with galleries, antique shops, studios and performance venues clustered around Congress Street. Visit the Children's Museum of Maine, and don't miss First Friday Art Walks.

York is America's oldest chartered city. Enjoy miles of beautiful beaches, food, shopping and outdoor fun. Leave time for the Museums of Old York and the Old Gaol—the nation's oldest jailhouse—and picturesque Cape Neddick "Nubble" Light.

South Berwick on the Piscataqua River is home to historic homes such as the **Sarah Orne Jewett House**. Try the local wine from **Salmon Falls Winery** or hike in **Vaughn Woods State Park**. Nearby is **Mt. Agamenticus Conservation Region** with hiking and biking trails.

Ogunquit, an early 20th-century art colony, is a year-round resort town. Stroll along Marginal Way, visit the Ogunquit Museum of American Art, enjoy the boutiques, galleries and cafes in Perkins Cove, and along Shore Road and Main Street, and relax on Ogunquit Beach, named "best beach in New England" by New England Cable News.

Wells has four sandy beaches and stunning natural conservation areas. Bird watch along the salt marshes of the Rachel Carson Wildlife Refuge. Hike in the Wells Reserve at Laudholm. Enjoy four seasons of outdoor recreation, shopping and fine dining.

The Kennebunks—Kennebunk, Kennebunkport,
Arundel and Cape Porpoise—offer arts, entertainment
and pristine beaches. Visit historic homes like the Nott
House. Drive by the Bush presidential retreat at Walker's
Point. Shop, dine and gallery hop in Dock Square.

Biddeford and Saco are sister cities. Investigate the Dyer Library/Saco Museum. Shop along Main Street and visit the brewpub on Saco Island. Canoe the Saco River or discover the beaches at Biddeford Pool, Fortunes Rocks, Camp Ellis and Ferry Beach State Park.

Top Ten Trails in Aroostook

1. Deboullie Public Reserve - North Maine Woods
Multiple trails throughout area totaling 7 miles.
Access is gained by private gravel roads leaving Route 161 in St.
Francis, or off Route 11 in Portage, Maine.

2. Aroostook State Park – Presque IsleQuaQua Jo Mountain - 3 mile loop up South Peak and down North

Peak.

3. Big Rock Mountain – Mars Hill

Multiple trails around the mountain with twenty-eight wind turbines each rising almost 400 feet into the air.

4. Haystack Mountain – Castle HillThe short ¼ mile but steep climb takes you up one of Northern Maine's extinct volcanos.

5. National Wildlife Refuge - LimestoneSeveral trails totaling approximately 6 miles through the various habitats found on the refuge.

Bangor is the historic and cultural hub of the region. Revisit the city's proud logging heritage at the Maine Forest and Logging Museum. Bring the kids to the Maine Discovery Museum. Explore the Wabanaki Arts Center in Old Town. And visit nearby Orono, home of the University of Maine.

Peaks Kenny State Park in **Dover-Foxcroft** is the ideal picnic spot, nestled in the mountains along the shores of **Sebec Lake**, with scenic views of **Borestone Mountain**. Camp, hike, swim or fish for landlocked salmon and lake trout.

Samuel Champlain explored the area that now includes Acadia National Park in 1604, naming it "Isle des Monts Desert" because of the bare granite summits. In 1916, a group in Hancock County led by George B. Dorr offered 6,000 acres to the U.S. government for conservation, land that President Woodrow Wilson designated Sieur de Monts National Monument. In 1919, Lafavette National Park was established. Acadia received its present name in 1929, and today it is rated among the 10 most-visited national parks. The park has about

on the "Most Beautiful Island in America."

47,000 acres (including conservation easements), encompassing mountains, lakes, forest and shoreline. For many people, a Maine vacation would not be complete without a visit to Acadia.

In the tradition of its founders. individuals have donated all of the park's lands. Between 1915 and 1933, John D. Rockefeller Jr. contributed more than 11,000 acres and built the wonderful carriage roads. These broad, smooth, graveled byways delight equestrians, hikers, bicyclists, snowshoers and cross-country skiers. The carriage roads

encircle Jordan Pond and Eagle Lake and wind around Sargent and Penobscot Mountains, providing stunning views of Frenchman Bay and Somes Sound.

Northern and temperate climate zones overlap here, resulting in an abundance of wildlife, including 300 species of birds. The park also offers:

- More than 120 miles of hiking trails with breathtaking views
- Two campgrounds
- Park Loop Road, a 20-mile drive starting at the Hulls Cove Visitor Center, that brings you to Sand Beach, Thunder Hole, Otter Cliffs, Jordan Pond and the summit of Cadillac Mountain, A self-guiding tape is available at the Visitor Center.
- Swimming beaches with lifeguards (one on the ocean at Sand Beach, one at warmer Echo Lake).
- The Wild Gardens of Acadia at Sieur de Monts Spring, where more than 400 plants are labeled and displayed in their habitat

Start your visit to Acadia at Hulls Cove Visitor Center, open from mid-April through October 31. Ask for a schedule of ranger-led activities that include boat cruises, hikes, walks, talks, children's programs and evening programs. During the winter, visit Park Headquarters on Highway 233, three miles west of Bar Harbor.

Most of the park is located on Mount Desert Island, easily accessible by car from Bangor and the coast. Hancock County Airport is minutes away. The Island Explorer shuttle bus picks visitors up at their lodging or campground and links them to destinations across Mount Desert Island and into Acadia National Park. The service is supported in part by park fees, so the ride is fare-free. The shuttle operates from late June to mid-October.

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

Located on Mount Desert Island, the third largest island on the eastern seaboard, Bar Harbor has enchanted visitors throughout the ages with its incredible natural beauty, cultural traditions and endless opportunities for recreation.

Located on the shores of Frenchman Bay, Bar Harbor offers the charm of a small Maine fishing village with a wide range of services, accommodations, restaurants, activities, shopping, and cultural heritage.


Bar Harbor is home to Acadia National Park. Surrounded on three sides by the mountains of Acadia National Park, Bar Harbor serves as the perfect base for exploring the park.

Acadia National Park is the only national park in the Northeast and is big on attractions. Early risers can drive, bike, or hike up Cadillac Mountain, the highest point on the East Coast, to watch the sunrise. They'll be the first in the United States to see the dawning of a new day. Later they can stop in for popovers and strawberry jam at the famous Jordan Pond House, a delightful restaurant founded in the early 1870s.

Motorists who drive the Park Loop Road enjoy a 27-mile ride along oceanside cliffs and through mountain forests, stopping at scenic turnouts and notable attractions along the way, like the mighty Thunder Hole and Sand Beach. The trip is a must.

One of the most amazing features of Acadia National Park is the interlaced system of hiking trails and carriage roads. With varied lengths and difficulty levels, the 130 miles of trails appeal to everyone from casual walkers to seasoned tri-athletes. Hike, bike, snowshoe, cross-country ski—or go on horseback.

Bar Harbor and Acadia National Park are home to a variety of wildlife. Whales, porpoises, seals, bald eagles, peregrine falcons, osprey and puffins are commonly sighted among the rocky-cliffed coastline of our region. You may also catch a glimpse of a deer or fox as well as the more elusive moose or black bear. Bar Harbor and Acadia National Park have become known world-wide as one of the best destinations for bird and wildlife watching.











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
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
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
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
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


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
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
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

In **Augusta**, Maine's capital city, you can explore 12,000 years of history at the **Maine State Museum** and visit the Capitol Building with its 180-foot granite dome. The **Belgrade Lakes** region inspired Ernest Thompson to write his play, *On Golden Pond*. Enjoy superb **fishing**, **boating**, **hiking**, **biking** and **golf** on a championship course, plus spectacular **fall foliage** and winter **cross-country skiing** and **ice fishing**.


The Forks, hub of whitewater rafting, is where the Dead and Kennebec Rivers converge. Local guides provide gear, meals and lodging. Come also for fishing, hiking on the Appalachian Trail, mountain biking, hunting, ATVing, moose spotting and snowmobiling. Make the half-mile trek to 96-foot Moxie Falls.

The Old Canada Road National Scenic Byway (Route 201) traces a centuries-old travel route between Maine and Canada. Wind through scenic forests, mountains and old-time villages, along the Kennebec River, Wyman Lake and the Dead River, between Solon and the Quebec border.

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The **Kennebec-Chaudiere Corridor** stretches into Quebec, marking the early, river trading routes of the Abenaki, and the much-traveled path of European settlers. Look for interpretive signs and maps at locations along **Route 201**.

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- Hike or cross-country ski at the new Grand Falls Hut on the banks of the Dead River, part of the Maine Huts & Trails system.
- Reserve your seats at the Shakespearean Theater of Maine in Monmouth, a year-round professional repertory company.
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- Head to Jackman where you can canoe the 34-mile Moose River Bow Trip, one of Maine's finest wilderness paddling adventures.
