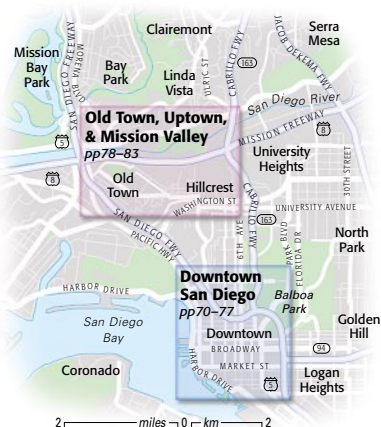

TOP 10 San Diego Highlights

Blessed by a sunny climate that never varies ten degrees from moderate and a splendid setting along the Pacific Ocean, San Diegans can well boast they live the California Dream. Although non-stop outdoor recreation, a vibrant downtown, and world-class attractions keep the city's spirit young, its heart lies in its Spanish beginnings as the birthplace of California.



1 Gaslamp Quarter

Old-fashioned wrought-iron gas lamps lead the way to the hottest scene in town. Rocking nightspots and a dazzling selection of restaurants give life to San Diego's original Victorian downtown (see pp8–9).



2 Embarcadero

With its nautical museums, vintage ships, and superb views across a harbor busy with sailboats, ferries, and battleships, the Embarcadero links the city to its ocean heritage (see pp10–13).

Balboa Park & San Diego Zoo

San Diegans take pride in having one of the finest urban parks in the world. Its famous zoo, fascinating museums, and exquisite gardens offer endless activities (see pp14–19).



4 Old Town State Historic Park

The original location and social center of San Diego until 1872, adobe houses, old wood-frame buildings, and artifacts belonging to its pioneer families have been faithfully restored (see pp22–3).



5 Coronado

This idyllic community is recognizable throughout the world by the fabulous Hotel del Coronado. Coronado's white sandy beaches, sidewalk cafés, and oceanfront mansions have enticed visitors for over a century (see pp24–5).



6 Point Loma

In 1542, Juan Cabrillo arrived at Ballast Point, claiming California for Spain. Once a whaling, fishing, and leather processing center, stunning homes and marinas now grace Point Loma's waterfront (see pp26–7).



7 Mission San Diego de Alcalá

Father Junípero Serra established this mission in 1769. The first of 21, the mission aimed to Christianize the Native Americans and affirm Spain's presence in California (see pp28–9).



8 SeaWorld

At one of the premiere attractions of Southern California, leaping killer whales, cavorting dolphins, and promenading sea lion divas entertain over four million visitors a year (see pp30–31).



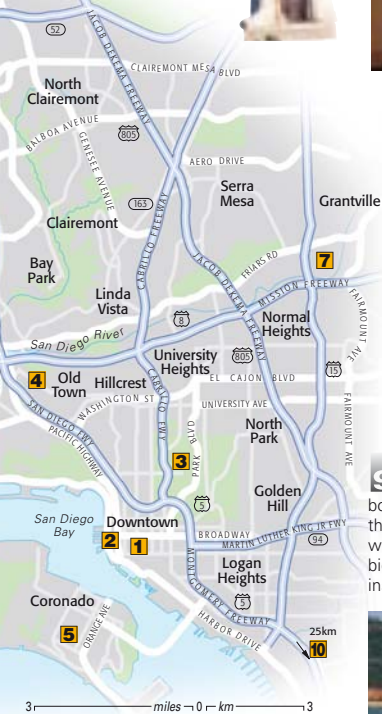
9 La Jolla

Multi-million-dollar seaside villas, boutiques, and elegant restaurants line the streets of this exclusive community, which is also noted for its prestigious biotech and oceanographic research institute (see pp32–3).



10 Tijuana

Only 20 minutes south of San Diego but a whole world away, this famous border town offers great shopping and top-rated restaurants. And yes, striped burros and black velvet Elvis paintings still exist (see pp34–5).





Top 10 Gaslamp Quarter

A hip nightlife, trendy restaurants, and unique boutiques compete for attention in San Diego's most vibrant neighborhood. Alonzo Horton's 1867 New Town (see p38) seemed doomed to the wrecking ball in the 1970s, but a civic revitalization program transformed the dilapidated area into a showcase destination. By 1980, the Gaslamp Quarter was decreed a National Historic District with its quaint Victorian, Italianate, and Renaissance structures.

1 William Heath Davis House

Named after the man who tried but failed to develop San Diego in 1850, the museum is home to the Gaslamp Quarter Historical Foundation. It is the oldest wooden structure in downtown San Diego (above).

2 Louis Bank of Commerce

A bank until 1893, this Victorian structure (right) became Wyatt Earp's (see p39) favorite bar. It once contained the Golden Poppy Hotel, a notorious brothel. Present-day offices are much tamer.



3 Yuma Building

Captain Wilcox of the US *Invincible* owned downtown's first brick structure in 1849. Named for his business dealings in Yuma, Arizona, residential lofts with bay windows now occupy the building's upper levels.

4 Old City Hall

Dating from 1874, this Italianate building features 16-ft (5-m) ceilings, brick arches, classical columns, and a wrought-iron cage elevator. In 1900, the entire city government would fit inside. Today, the building houses offices and a restaurant.





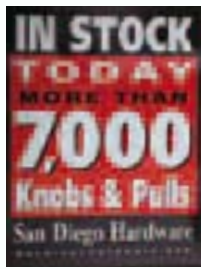
5 Balboa Theatre

This landmark 1,500-seat theater (right) once had waterfalls flanking the stage. Though closed for renovations until 2007, do notice the beautiful tiled dome on the roof, which is similar to the one on the Santa Fe Depot.



6 San Diego Hardware

Once a dance hall then a five-and-dime store, this building housed one of San Diego's oldest businesses (below), founded in 1892. Though the store is relocating, the original storefront will remain.



7 Keating Building

Fannie Keating built this Romanesque-style building (above) in 1890 in honor of her husband George. It once housed the town's most prestigious offices.

8 Ingle Building

The Hard Rock Café was once known as the Golden Lion Tavern. Note the lion sculptures, the stained-glass windows, and the 1906 stained-glass dome over the bar.

9 Lincoln Hotel

Built in 1913, the four-story tiled structure features Chinese elements and the original beveled glass in its upper stories. Japanese prisoners were housed here before departing for internment camps during World War II. The Lincoln is now home to low-income residents.

10 Wrought-iron Gas Lamps

Although San Diego's historic district is named after the quaint green wrought-iron gas lamps that line the streets, they run on electricity.

Stingaree District

After its legitimate businesses relocated in the late 19th century, New Town was home to 120 brothels, opium dens, 71 saloons, and gambling halls, some operated by famous lawman Wyatt Earp. It became known as "Stingaree" because one could be stung on its streets as easily as by the stingaree fish in the bay. After police unsuccessfully tried cleaning up Stingaree in 1912, it slowly disintegrated into a slum until rescued by the Gaslamp Quarter Foundation some 50 years later.



If you want to enjoy the architecture, come during the day when the district is less crowded.



Top 10 Embarcadero

Ever since Juan Cabrillo sailed into San Diego Bay in 1542 (see p38), much of the city's life has revolved around its waterfront. Pioneers stepped ashore on its banks; immigrants worked as whalers and fishermen; the US Navy left an indelible mark with its shipyards and warships. Tourism has added another layer to the harbor's lively atmosphere. The Embarcadero welcomes visitors with its art displays, walkways, nautical museums, harbor cruises, and benches on which to sit and enjoy the uninterrupted harbor activity.

For a quick bite, try Anthony's Fishette at 1360 North Harbor Drive. Sandwiches and salads are the best outdoor options.

Pedicabs are usually available to take you down to Seaport Village.

1 San Diego County Administration Center

Dedicated by President F. Roosevelt, the 1936 civic structure (above) looks especially magisterial when flood-lit at night. Enter through the west door and feel free to wander about (see p44).

2 San Diego Harbor

One of the greatest attractions of the Embarcadero is watching the bustling harbor, as Navy destroyers, aircraft carriers, ferries, cruise ships, and sailboats glide past. Be a part of the action by taking a harbor cruise.



3 Maritime Museum

Nautical lovers can marvel at *Medea*, *Star of India* (below), and *Berkeley*. All three vintage ships have been restored to their former glory (see p42).



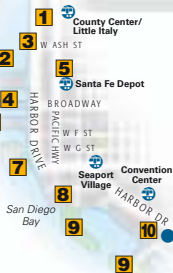
4 Piers

Glistening cruise ships bound for Mexico and the Panama Canal tie up at B Street Pier. Harbor cruises and ferries to Coronado can be caught nearby.



**5 Santa Fe Depot**

The train cars may be modern, but the atmosphere recalls the stylish days of rail travel. The interiors of the Spanish-Colonial style building are resplendent with burnished oak benches, original tiles (*left*), bronze-and-glass chandeliers, and wonderful friezes depicting Native American themes.

**9 Embarcadero Marina Park**

Relax on one of the grassy expanses to enjoy the excellent views of the harbor and Coronado Bridge. Joggers and bicyclists use the paths around the park (*see pp47*), and on weekends, entertainers and artists demonstrate their work.

10 San Diego Convention Center

The center was designed along nautical lines to complement the waterfront location, with its flying buttresses, skylight tubes, and rooftop sails.

**6 San Diego Aircraft Carrier Museum**

The 1,000-ft (305-m) USS *Midway* (*see pp12–13*), commissioned in 1945, was once the world's largest warship. Many docents on board are veterans who served on the carrier.

**8 Seaport Village**

New England and Spanish design blend eclectically in this waterfront area with brilliant harbor views (*above & pp49*).

**San Diego & the Military**

San Diego has had strong military ties ever since the Spanish built the presidio (fortress) in 1769. Hosting the largest military complex in the world, the military contributes handsomely to the local economy. Their presence is everywhere: Navy SEALs train at Coronado, three aircraft carriers and warships berth in the harbor, and Marines land amphibious tanks along Camp Pendleton. Ship parades and tours are popular events during San Diego's October Fleet Week.

7 Tuna Harbor

San Diego was once home to the world's largest tuna fleet, with 200 commercial boats. Portuguese immigrants dominated the trade until the canneries moved to Mexico and Samoa. Even today, some tuna boats remain and the US Tuna Foundation still keeps its offices here (*right*).

TOP 10 Aircraft Carrier Museum: USS *Midway*

1 Hangar Deck

The hangar deck stored the carrier's aircraft, with large elevators raising planes up to the flight deck as needed. Now the carrier's entry level, it has audio guides, aircraft displays, a gift shop, café, and restrooms. Don't miss the 24-ft (7-m) Plexiglas model of the *Midway* used by shipbuilders in World War II to construct the carrier.

2 Island

Sometimes called the Superstructure, ladders take you up to the navigation room and bridge, from where the ship's movements were commanded. The flight control deck oversaw aircraft operations.

3 Flight Deck

The area of the *Midway*'s flight deck is roughly the size of four football fields. Additional aircraft are on display here, as well as the entry to the Island. The flight deck stored planes on one end, while the angled deck

served as a runway for dramatic take-offs and landings.

4 Aircraft

Examples of eight typical carrier aircraft are located on the flight and hangar decks. Among the displays are the F-14 Tomcat, which flies at speeds exceeding Mach 2, a F-4 Phantom, and A-6 Intruder. The *Midway* once held up to 80 aircraft of various types.

5 Galley

The *Midway* could store up to 1.5-million lbs (680,388 kg) of dry provisions and a quarter-million lbs (113,398 kg) of meat and vegetables to feed a crew who ate 13,000 meals daily.

6 Post Office

The *Midway*'s crew often had to wait several weeks at a time for a Carrier Onboard Delivery flight to receive letters from home. The post office was also in charge of the disbursement of money orders.

7 Berthing Spaces

Sleeping berths for 400 of the 4,500 crew members are displayed on the hangar deck. Beds were too short to be comfortable for anyone over 6 ft (1.8 m), and the accompanying metal lockers could hold barely more than a uniform. Enlisted men were often just out of high school.

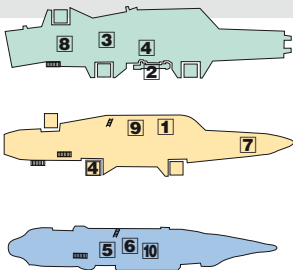


8 Arresting Wire & Catapults

Notice the arresting wire on the flight deck. This enabled a pilot to land a 30-ton jet cruising at 150 miles (241 km) an hour on an area the size of a tennis court. A hook attached to the tail of a plane grabbed the wire during landing. Two steam catapults helped propel the plane for take-off.

9 Virtual Reality Flight Simulations

For an additional price, which also includes a briefing, a flight suit, and 30 minutes of flight, you can experience flying a plane by taking the controls of a flight simulator. Also on hand are several standard flight stations, where, for another ticket, you can practice taking off from a carrier.

10 Metal Shop

Located on the mess deck, the metal shop produced metal structures and replicated metal parts for the ship or its aircraft. Self-sufficiency and versatility were the keywords for tours of duty when the ship would be away for months at a time.

History of the Midway

Commissioned on September 10, 1945, the Midway was named after the Battle of Midway, which was the turning point for the Allies in the War of the Pacific. She remained the largest ship in the world for ten years, and was the first ship too large to transit the Panama Canal. After the fall Saigon on April 30, 1975, she saw further action during Operation Desert Storm in 1991, and finished her years of service by evacuating military personnel threatened by the 1991 eruption of Mount Pinatubo in the Philippines. The Midway was fully decommissioned in 1992.

Balboa Park



Butterfly

For over 100 years, Balboa Park has awed San Diegans with its romantic hillside setting, lush landscaping, and splendid architecture. The park's magnificent Spanish architecture dates from the 1915–16 Panama-California Exposition. On weekends, thousands of visitors come to indulge their interests, whether it's for recreation, Shakespeare or art. However, the park is probably best known as the home of the world-famous San Diego Zoo, where almost 4,000 animals and 800 botanical species reside.

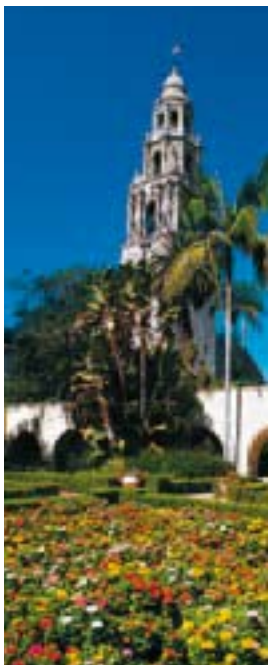
1 Reuben H. Fleet Science Center

Learn about electricity, digital recording, tornados, and even save Earth from destruction at the interactive Meteor Storm. Catch an IMAX movie or learn some astronomy at a planetarium show (see p52).



2 Casa del Prado

Rebuilt from a 1915 exposition hall, this Spanish-Colonial building (above) is an outstanding structure. Wall reliefs commemorate Father Junípero Serra and Juan Cabrillo. It is now used for community events.



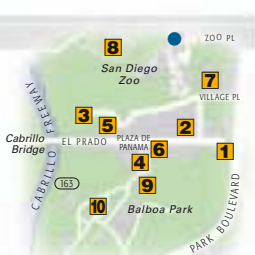
3 Old Globe Theatres

The Tony-winning Old Globe Theatre (below), Cassius Carter Center Stage, and Lowell Davies Festival Theatre form a cultural resource (see p50).



4 El Cid Statue

Rodrigo Diaz de Vivar, Campeador, better known as the Spanish hero El Cid, overlooks the Plaza de Panama. This 23-ft (7-m) tall bronze sculpture (right) was dedicated in 1930 as a symbolic guardian of Balboa Park.



6 House of Hospitality

Modeled on a hospital in Spain, this building was erected in 1915 for the Panama-California Exposition and reconstructed in the 1990s. It is now a visitor's center with helpful staff.

7 Spanish Village Art Center

Richard Requa (see p39), architect of the 1935–36 Exposition, wanted visitors to experience the simple life of a Spanish village. This complex now houses 37 studios where craftspeople and artists display their creations (below & p43).



8 San Diego Zoo

In this zoo (see pp16–17), thousands of animals thrive in recreated natural habitats. Thanks to successful breeding programs and webcams, endangered baby pandas (below) are now animal superstars.



5 California Building

Built for the 1915–16 Exposition, this building (above) with its 200-ft (61-m) tower has come to represent San Diego's identity. Famous figures of the city's past are represented on the exquisite façade. Inside is the Museum of Man (see p18).



9 Spreckels Organ Pavilion

The largest outdoor organ in the world contains 4,518 pipes (below). The metal curtain protecting the organ weighs close to 12 tons. Organ recitals are held every Sunday.



10 House of Pacific Relations

Founded in 1935, these cottages feature cultural ambassadors from 30 countries, who showcase their local traditions and histories.

Balboa Park & World War II

More than 2,000 beds were lined up in Balboa Park's museums to accommodate those wounded in the 1941 Pearl Harbor attack. All buildings were requisitioned for barracks. The park became one of the largest hospital training centers in the world: 600 Navy nurses were stationed at the House of Hospitality, the Globe Theatre became a scullery and the lily pond served as a rehab pool. In 1947, the military returned the park to the city.



Performers at the House of Pacific Relations present ethnic songs and dances every Sunday from March to October.

TOP 10 San Diego Zoo

1 Giant Panda Research Station

Three giant panda superstars spend most of their day eating bamboo, oblivious to millions of adoring fans that line up for a glimpse or to watch them via a 24-hour panda cam. Two panda births have occurred at the zoo in the last four years. The paternity of cub Mei Sheng, whose birth on August 19, 2003 was broadcast over the Internet, remained unclear until DNA testing determined his daddy's identity. This is the only North American zoo to successfully breed this endangered species.

2 Polar Bear Plunge

In this recreated Arctic tundra habitat, polar bears lounge about and frolic in the chilly water of a 130,000-gallon plunge pool. Sometimes, for a special enrichment treat, zookeepers fill the enclosure with 18 tons of shaved snow for

the bears to play in. Don't miss the pool viewing area down below; the bears often swim right up to the window.

3 Scripps Aviary

Inside a massive mesh cage, experience an exotic rainforest with sounds of cascading water and 200 chirping, cawing, and screeching African birds. Sit on a bench amid lush vegetation and try to spot a silvery-checked hornbill or gold-breasted starling.

4 Gorilla Tropics

These Western lowland gorillas romp and climb over wide areas of jungle and grassland. Parent gorillas lovingly tend to their children, while others sit quietly with chins in hand, contemplating the strange creatures on the other side of the glass.

5 Tiger River

A misty, orchid-filled rainforest is home to the endangered Indo-Chinese tiger. Marvel at these wondrous animals as they sit majestically on the rocks, waterfalls flowing



behind them. In 2004, two new tigers, at the risk of destruction in their native Malaysian habitat, were rescued and introduced to Tiger River.



Tarantula

9 Reptile House

If it slithers, hisses, or rattles, it's here.

Be glad these animals, especially the king cobra, Albino python, and Gila monsters, are behind glass. Cages marked with a red dot indicate the venomous ones.

6 Ituri Forest

Meet Jabba, several thousand pounds of hippo, who lives in this re-creation of the Congo River Basin. Jabba shares his jungle home with forest buffaloes, swamp monkeys, and okapis, whose prehensile, long black tongues enable them to grab nearby leaves to eat.

7 Elephant Mesa

The endangered African and Asian elephants consume up to 125 lbs (57 kgs) of hay and 30 gallons of water a day. Keep your camera ready, as the elephants often toss barrels or scratch their back under a special roller. Asian elephants have dome-shaped backs, while the ears of an African elephant are shaped like the African continent.



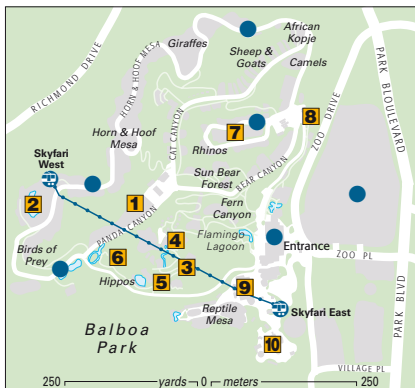

10 Children's Zoo

Little ones love petting the goats and sheep in the paddock (wash-up sinks are nearby), while older kids squeal with mischievous glee at the tarantulas, black-widow spiders, and hissing cockroaches. The nursery takes care of baby animals whose mothers can't look after them.

8 Koalas

With names like Koorine and Gidgee, who can resist these cuddly guys? With the largest koala colony outside Australia, the zoo's successful breeding program enables loans to zoos world-wide, and makes financial contributions to habitat conservation programs in Australia.



Take the double-deck bus tour first (drivers are fun and informative), and then return to what interests you.

TOP 10 Balboa Park Museums

1 San Diego Museum of Art

This exceptional 12,000-object collection includes works by old masters and major 19th- and 20th-century artists. Be sure to check out its Asian art collection and temporary exhibitions.

2 San Diego Museum of Man

Learn about evolution from a replica of a 4-million-year old human ancestor, and don't miss the mummy room. Artifacts from the Kumeyaay people, San Diego's original inhabitants, and a replica of a huge Mayan monument emphasize the culture of the Americas. 📍 Map L1 • (619) 239-2001 • Open 10am–4:30pm daily

3 San Diego Natural History Museum

Galleries showcase the evolution and diversity of California. Exhibits, guided weekend nature walks, and field trips explore the natural world. 📍 Map M1 • (619) 232-3821 • Open 10am–5pm daily

4 Timken Museum of Art

The collection at this museum includes Rembrandt's *Saint Bartholomew*, and works by Rubens and Bruegel the Elder.

5 Mingei International Museum

The Japanese word *mingei* means “art of the people,” a perfect description of this display of international folk art. Exhibitions include textiles, jewelry, furniture, and pottery. 📍 Map L1 • (619) 239-0003 • Open 10am–4pm Tue–Sun

6 Museum of Photographic Arts

Several temporary exhibitions featuring the world's most celebrated camera geniuses are mixed with pieces from the museum's permanent collection. The theater screens film classics. 📍 Map L1 • (619) 238-7559 • Open 10am–5pm daily

7 San Diego Historical Society Museum

An alternating collection of old photographs and artifacts offer a good introduction to San Diego's early years. 📍 Map L1 • (619) 232-6203 • Open 10am–5pm daily



8 San Diego Automotive Museum

The Mother of Balboa Park

Horticulturalist Kate Sessions needed room to establish a nursery in 1892. She struck a deal with the city of San Diego in which she promised to plant 100 trees a year in the then-called City Park and 300 trees elsewhere in exchange for 36 acres. A 35-year planting frenzy resulted in 10,000 glorious trees and shrubs, shady arbors draped with bougainvillea, and flower gardens that burst with color throughout the year.

TOP 10

Old Town State Historic Park

After Mexico won its independence from Spain in 1821, many retired soldiers created what is now Old Town, laying their homes and businesses around the plaza in typical Spanish style. Through trade with Boston, the town began to prosper. After a fire in 1872 destroyed much of the commercial center, San Diego moved to a "New Town" closer to the bay. Today, you can explore the preserved and restored structures of San Diego's pioneer families.

Head to one of San Diego's most famous Mexican restaurants, Old Town Mexican Café & Cantina (see p83), and watch the ladies make tortillas as you have lunch.

One-hour walking tours led by park rangers leave daily at 11am and 2pm from the Robinson-Rose House.

Many of the park concessionaires sell a lot of kitsch; you'll do better outside the park, or try the lovely shops at Bazaar del Mundo.

1 Plaza

Spanish communities used the town plaza for bullfights, political events, executions, and fiestas. Ever since the American flag was raised in 1846, tradition maintains that the Old Town flagpole must be made from a ship's mast.

2 La Casa de Estudillo

Built by José Estudillo, the Presidio's commander, this 1827 adobe home (*below*) is Old Town's showpiece. Workmen shaped the curved red tiles of the roof by spreading clay over their legs. Thick walls helped support the roof.

3 La Casa de Bandini

Peruvian Juan Bandini arrived in San Diego in 1819 and became one of its wealthiest citizens. Following business losses, his home was converted into a hotel. It's now home to a Mexican restaurant.

4 Seeley Stable

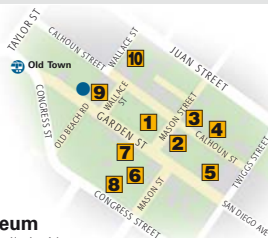
Until railroads proved more efficient, Albert Seeley ran a stagecoach business between San Diego and LA. Today, this reconstructed barn houses original carriages and wagons from the Wild West.





San Diego Union Historical Museum

5 This wood-frame house (above) was built in New England and shipped down in 1851. Home to the early years of *The San Diego Union*, a faithful restoration depicts the newsroom of the city's oldest newspaper.



Robinson-Rose House

Docents are on hand to answer questions at this 150-year-old house which is the headquarters of Old Town (below). Look out for the model of the 1872 Old Town.



Bazaar del Mundo

10 Vibrant colors and unique shops present the best of Latin America. Andean bands and folk dancers perform amidst Guatemalan weavings and Mexican folk art.

First Impressions

In his epic story of early San Diego, *Two Years Before the Mast*, published in 1840, Richard Henry Dana described the town as "a small settlement directly before the fort, composed of about 40 dark-brown-looking huts or houses, and two larger ones plastered." Bostonian Mary Chase Walker, San Diego's first schoolhouse teacher, was more blunt: "Of all the dilapidated, miserable looking places I had ever seen this was the worst."

Mason Street School

This one-room school opened in 1856. Its first teacher, Mary Chase Walker, resigned her \$65-a-month position when townspeople complained that she had invited a black woman to lunch.

The Machado-Stewart House

Jack Stewart married Rosa Machado in 1845 and moved to this adobe home, where the family line continued until 1966. The structure's inevitable deterioration finally compelled them to move.

Colorado House

The name Wells Fargo came to symbolize the opening of the American West. At this little museum housed in a former hotel, a restored stagecoach (right) is the main exhibit.



The future of the popular Bazaar del Mundo is uncertain, it may be relocated.



Top 10 Coronado

Sometimes described as an island because its village-like atmosphere is far removed from the big city, picturesque Coronado lies on a sliver of land between the Pacific Ocean and San Diego Bay. More retired Navy officers live here than any other place in the US, and although the military presence is high, it's unobtrusive. For over 100 years, visitors have flocked to Coronado to be part of this charmed life. For even with its thriving resorts, restaurants, sidewalk cafés, and unique shops, the village never seems overwhelmed.

1 Hotel del Coronado

A San Diego symbol, this 1887–88 Queen Anne wooden masterpiece (*right*) is a National Historic Landmark. This was the first hotel west of the Mississippi to be equipped with electric lights. Don't miss the photo gallery.

2 Coronado Bridge

Connecting San Diego to Coronado since 1969, this 2.2-mile (3.5-km) span (*below*) has won architectural awards for its unique design. Struts and braces hidden in a box girder give it a sleek look, and its blue color imitates the sky.



3 Mansions along Ocean Boulevard

Designed by prominent early 20th-century architects Hebbard and Gill, mansions (*above*) dominate Coronado's oceanfront.

4 Meade House

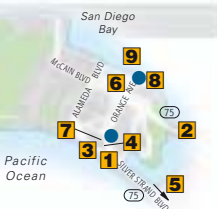
L. Frank Baum made Coronado his home in 1904 and produced much of his work while living at this charming house, now a private residence.





Silver Strand State Beach

5 In 1890, John D. Spreckles (see p39) built bungalows and tents along the beach (above). "Tent City" allowed all families to enjoy the once-exclusive beach. Today, anyone can come to dig for clams, beachcomb, and enjoy roasted hot dogs.



San Diego Ferry

9 Before the Coronado Bridge, access was only possible by a long drive around Southern San Diego or via the ferry. The ferry (below) is now only for passengers.



Naval Air Station North Island & the US Naval Amphibious Base

You might see navy planes flying overhead or Navy SEALs training on Silver Strand Beach. Lindbergh (see p39) began his flight across the Atlantic from here.



Orange Avenue

6 Coronado's main shopping street (right) is filled with elegant restaurants and sidewalk cafés, as well as a theater and a historical museum. Independence Day and Christmas parades bring residents out to celebrate in true hometown style.



The Duke & Duchess of Windsor

When the British King Edward VIII gave up his throne to marry American Wallis Simpson, romantics insisted they originally met at the Hotel del Coronado. In 1920, Wallis Spencer, then married to a naval officer of that name, lived at the hotel. That April, Edward visited Coronado as Prince of Wales. It is unclear whether the future couple actually met; it wasn't until 15 years later that they were formally introduced.

Coronado Museum of History and Art

Housed in a distinctive 1910 Neo-Classical bank building, galleries exhibit Coronado's early history. Fascinating photos reveal the initial years of the Hotel del Coronado, Tent City, and the military.

Ferry Landing Market Place

Next to the ferry dock is a shopping area surrounded by walkways and benches offering harbor views. The shops sell beachwear, jewelry, souvenirs, and art. This is a handy spot to rent a bike or grab a snack.



Take a 40-minute guided motor tour in a 1965 Volkswagen Microbus that costs only \$15. Call (619) 435-0511.



TOP 10 Point Loma

Point Loma was once one of the city's most rough-and-tumble areas. San Diego's first boats were tied up here, followed by the largest whaling operation on the West Coast and leather tanning and tallow production. Today, sailboats and yachts grace the marinas, and the waterfront homes make up some of the most expensive real estate in the city. The Cabrillo National Monument, the third most-visited monument in the US, boasts the most breathtaking views of the entire city.

At the Cabrillo Monument Visitor Center, some vending machines offer snack food. But if you want to spend the day hiking the trails and exploring the tide pools, bring food and water with you.

If it's a cloudy day, wait until the sun comes out to visit. Bring binoculars if you can, to enjoy the incredible views.

The San Diego Metropolitan Transit comes out to the monument. Take bus 26 from the Old Town Transportation Center.

1 Cabrillo Statue

The actual spot where Cabrillo stepped ashore is on a spit of land downhill at Ballast Point. However, this magnificent statue (*right*) is a worthy tribute to the brave explorer and his men who ventured across uncharted seas to claim new territory for Spain.



2 Old Point Loma Lighthouse

This Cape Cod-style building (*right*) was completed in 1855. Unfortunately, coastal fog so often obscured the beacon light that another lighthouse, the New Point Loma Lighthouse, had to be built below the cliff.

3 Visitor Center

Park rangers are on hand to answer questions. Browse through the center's outstanding books about the Spanish, Native Americans, and early California, or enjoy the daily film screenings.

4 Bayside Trail

A two-mile (3.2-km) round-trip hiking path winds along an old military defense road. Signs along the way help you identify indigenous plants such as sage scrub, lemonade berry, and Indian paintbrush.



**5 Military Exhibit**

After the 1941 Pearl Harbor attack, many felt that San Diego would be the next target. The exhibit explores how the military created a coastal defense system and the largest gun in the US.

7 Sunset Cliffs

A path runs along the edge of these spectacular 400-ft (122-m) high cliffs (*above*), but signs emphatically warn against their instability. Access the beach from Sunset Cliffs Park.

**9 Tide Pools**

Now protected by law, starfish, anemones, warty sea cucumbers and wooly sculpins thrive in their own little world.

**10 Point Loma Nazarene University**

Once a yoga commune, much of the original architecture of this Christian university (*above*) is still intact.

Juan Cabrillo

After participating in the conquest of Mexico and Guatemala, Juan Cabrillo was instructed to explore the northern limits of the West Coast of New Spain in search of gold, and to discover a route to Asia. He arrived at Ballast Point on September 28, 1542, claimed the land for the crown of Spain and named it San Miguel. Unfortunately, Cabrillo died only a few months later from complications of a broken bone. Spain considered the expedition a failure and left its new territory untouched for the next 225 years.

**8 Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery**

The southern end of Point Loma belongs to the military installations of Rosecrans Fort. Innumerable crosses mark the graves (*below*) of 80,000 US veterans, some of whom died at the Battle of San Pasqual in the Mexican-American War.

**6 Whale Overlook**

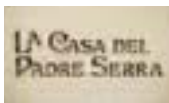
Pacific gray whales migrate yearly to give birth in the warm, sheltered waters of Baja California before heading back to Alaska for a summer of good eating. January and February are the best times to spot whales (*above*).





TOP 10 Mission San Diego de Alcalá

When Russian fur traders neared California in the 18th century, Spain knew it had to establish a presence in its half-forgotten territory. Founded by Father Junípero Serra in 1769, this was California's first mission. Serra encouraged Native Americans to live here, exchanging work in the fields for religious instruction. Harassment by soldiers and lack of water supplies caused the mission to be moved from its original location in Old Town to this site. In 1976, Pope Paul VI bestowed the mission with the status of minor basilica.

Food and drinks are not allowed inside the mission.

The San Diego Trolley stops a good three blocks away, so you should drive to the mission if walking is difficult.

1 La Casa del Padre Serra

The original 1774 adobe walls and beams survived an Indian attack, a military occupation, earthquakes, and years of neglect. Padres lived simply and with few comforts.



2 Church

The width of a mission church was determined by the size of available beams. Restored to specifications of a former 1813 church on this site, the church (above) features adobe bricks, the original floor tiles, and wood-
en door beams.



3 Campanario

This 46-ft (14-m) belltower defines California mission architecture. Two of the bells are considered originals, and the crown atop one bell signifies it was cast in a royal foundry.

4 Cemetery

Although it no longer contains real graves, this is considered the oldest cemetery (below) in

California. The crosses are made of original mission tiles. A memorial honors Native Americans who died during the mission era.



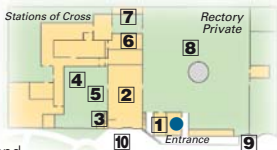
5 Garden Statues

Four statues of St. Anthony of Padua (*right*), patron saint of the Indians, Father Serra, St. Joseph, saint of Serra's expedition, and St. Francis oversee the inner garden.



6 Padre Luis Jayme Museum

Artifacts here include records of births and deaths in Father Serra's handwriting, the last crucifix he held, and old photos showing the extent of the mission's dereliction prior to restoration efforts.



9 Padre Luis Jayme Memorial

On November 5, 1775, Indians attacked the mission. A cross (*below*) marks the approximate spot where Kumeyaay Indians killed Jayme, California's first martyr.



10 El Camino Real

Also called the Royal Road or the King's Highway, this road linked the 21 California missions, each a day's distance apart by horseback.

Father Junípero Serra

Franciscan Father Junípero Serra spent 20 years in Mexico before arriving to establish a Spanish presence in California. Crossing the desert in what came to be called the "Sacred Expedition," the appalling conditions of the march left few survivors. But Serra, undeterred, established California's first mission in 1769. He founded nine missions by 1784.

7 Chapel

Taken from a Carmelite monastery in Plasencia, Spain, this small chapel (*below*) features choir stalls, a throne, and an altar dating from the 1300s. The choir stalls are held together by grooves, not nails. The raised seats allowed the monks to stand while singing.



8 Gardens

Exotic plants add to the lush landscaping surrounding the mission (*above*). With few indigenous Californian plants available, missionaries and settlers introduced plants from all parts of the world, including cacti from Mexico and aloes and bird of paradise from South Africa.



Top 10 SeaWorld

SeaWorld's great black-and-white whale superstar Shamu is an identifiable San Diego icon, with 12,000 marine and aquatic animals serving as his extras. Opened in 1964, SeaWorld has grown into an internationally acclaimed attraction welcoming four million visitors a year. It also operates a center for oceanography and marine mammal research, and rehabilitates stranded and injured animals. Tropically landscaped grounds and educational exhibits provide respite from the constant action.

1 Shamu Adventure Show

Shamu and two grandbabies perform to choreographed perfection in a seven-million-gallon tank (right). You'll be in awe of these magnificent animals, right from the show's start to finish.



2 Dolphin Discovery Show

Atlantic bottlenose dolphins (below), and a 3,000-lb (1,361-kg) pilot whale leap, cavort, and dive to music. Enthusiastic trainers dance and dive with them in this lively and entertaining show.



3 Penguin Encounter

Penguins here live in an environment that re-creates conditions in Antarctica (above). Twice a day, feeders come out to discuss penguin habits and answer your questions.

4 Fools With Tools

Clyde and Seamore are two sea lions that upstage the show's human hosts in a hilarious take-off of a home improvement TV show.





Shamu's Happy Harbor

5 Airbags, nets, and run-through tubes are ideal for active children (*above*). Most popular is Pete's Waterworm, where kids can crawl through watery tubes.



Shark Encounter

9 Learn to differentiate between a male and female shark as you step on a walkway with an underwater view (*below*) of several shark species.



Journey to Atlantis

10 An 8-passenger Greek fishing boat twists and drops unpredictably through mist and special effects while teaching you about the lost city of Atlantis.

Manatee Rescue

6 SeaWorld has rehabilitated several manatees and put them on display until they are ready to be returned to the wild. You can view them in a 215,000-gallon river that re-creates their natural environment.

Shipwreck Rapids

8 If you aren't already wet enough, try a ride on Shipwreck Rapids, a 9-person raft-like inner tube that plunges down rapids and passes under bridges where, for a small fee, others can squirt water at you.

Wild Arctic

7 Pretend you're on an expedition to the Arctic on a ride that simulates a jet copter landing. Walk past an above- and below-water tank to view white beluga whales and walrus-es, and don't miss the Arctic fox and polar bear (*right*).



Animal Rescue Programs

Every year hundreds of stranded marine animals are rescued, treated, and released back into the wild by SeaWorld veterinarians. Local residents often bring in injured birds for rehabilitation. In 1988, two Hawaiian albatross that had flown off course were treated and transported back to Hawaii. The gathered data helps scientists determine population trends among threatened and endangered species.

TOP 10 La Jolla

Only barren pueblo land in 1886, developer Frank Botsford bought a substantial area in La Jolla which he subdivided. Other real estate developers soon caught on to La Jolla's potential and built stylish resorts. But it wasn't until Ellen Browning Scripps arrived in 1896 with her generous civic endowments that the town developed as a research, education, and art center. Now, La Jolla sits on some of the most expensive real estate in the US. It's no wonder that residents refer to their slice of heaven as the "Jewel."



Torrey Pines State Reserve

The café at the Museum of Contemporary Art serves good sandwiches and salads.

Watch the paragliders launch from the Torrey Pines cliffs, or stroll the UCSD campus and its Stuart Collection.

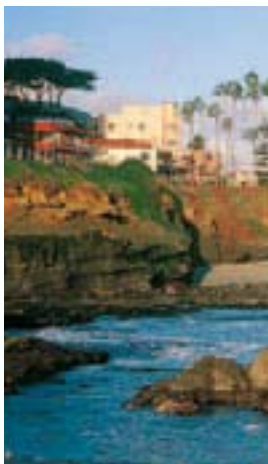


1 Museum of Contemporary Art

4 Soledad Mountain Veterans War Memorial

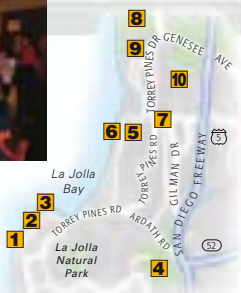
This memorial, erected in 1954 to honor Korean veterans, now honors veterans from all wars. Six walls beneath a 43-ft (13-m) high cross hold 1,400 plaques.





5 Birch Aquarium at Scripps

Brilliantly colored underwater habitats dazzle and educate at this marine museum (*above*). You'll feel like a scuba diver when viewing an offshore kelp bed housed in a 70,000-gallon tank. A popular interactive exhibit is an ocean supermarket scanner that demonstrates our dependence on the sea.



9 Salk Institute

Jonas Salk founded this institution (*see p44*) for biomedical research in 1960. Its scientists explore gene therapy, AIDS, cancer, and diabetes.



10 University of California, San Diego (UCSD)

Six colleges make up one of the most prestigious public universities (*above*) in the country.

Ellen Browning Scripps

Born in England in 1836, Scripps moved to the US in 1844. She became a teacher, investing her savings in her brother's newspaper ventures, the *Detroit Evening News* and the *Cleveland Press*. Already wealthy, she inherited a vast fortune upon her brother's death in 1900. Scripps spent her last 35 years in La Jolla, giving away millions of dollars for the good of humanity. Her name now adorns countless schools, hospitals, research institutions, and parks.

6 Scripps Institution of Oceanography

Leading the way in oceanographic research, this 1903 institute (*right*) is the world's largest. A part of UCSD, over 1,000 scientists at 18 centers are developing the latest marine technologies.



8 Torrey Pines State Reserve

At this gorgeous reserve (*see p46*), hiking trails wind past coastal scrub, sculptured sandstone cliffs, wildflowers, and woodlands, with stunning views of the Pacific. Guided tours leave from the visitor center.



7 La Jolla Playhouse

Now UCSD's Mandell Weiss Center for the Performing Arts, additions to the Playhouse (*right*) include a state-of-the-art theater, design studios, rehearsal halls, and a restaurant.





TOP 10 Tijuana

The moment you step across "La Linea," as the border is called locally, the sensory assault is overwhelming: vendors, beggars, dust, souvenirs, music, and food smells are just the beginning. Leave the tourist zone and you'll find a city filled with some of the finest restaurants and cultural activities in Mexico and a community characterized by industriousness, resiliency, and resourcefulness.

1 Border Crossing

An estimated 60 million people pass through the world's busiest border every year. While traffic snakes for miles to enter the US, entering Mexico takes less than a minute.



2 Avenida Revolución

Bars, pharmacies, and souvenir shops embrace the tourist soul of Tijuana. Have your picture taken on the famous street corner burros, painted to look like zebras – an institution since 1954.

3 Centro Cultural de Tijuana (Cecut)

Classical music, dance, and traditional theater are performed here. In the same complex is the outstanding Museo de las Californias.

4 Frontón Jai Alai

Celebrities and the social elite once packed this Moorish palace to watch the fast-playing Jai Alai, a Basque game somewhat like squash. The landmark building (left) now hosts concerts and theater events.





5 Agua Caliente Racetrack
Opened in 1929 as the Agua Caliente Spa & Casino, this greyhound racetrack (*above*) is all that's left of the famous complex that once attracted Hollywood celebrities.



9 Museo de Cera
Tijuana's wax museum presents 86 figures taken from the annals of American and Mexican history, art, and pop culture.



10 Plaza Monumental
At Plaza Monumental (*above*), bullfighters from Mexico and Spain come to slay the bull in front of up to 25,000 aficionados. Day tours are available from San Diego.



6 Catedral de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe
Tijuana's oldest church (*above*) has evolved from its humble 1902 origins. Domes top the towers and gold leaf adorns the barrel-vaulted interior.

7 L.A. Cetto Cava
The vineyards of Baja are Mexico's largest, and this winery welcomes visitors for tours. The spotless facility offers dozens of wines for tasting and purchase, as well as wine-related souvenir items.

8 Museo Foreign Club
Old photos and artifacts will give you a nostalgic look into Tijuana's past. Its founder, William McCain Clauson, is usually on hand. A small art gallery upstairs features the works of various Mexican artists.

Tijuana's Maquiladoras

Tijuana's population is the fastest-growing in Mexico due in part to employment offered by scores of *maquiladora* factories that have sprung up. Taking advantage of low wages and close proximity to the US, workers at these foreign-owned plants assemble electronics, appliances, and TV sets. Wages are higher than elsewhere in Mexico but so is the cost of living.

TOP 10

Moments in History

1 In the Beginning

A skull discovered in 1929 established human presence in San Diego about 12,000 years ago. The Kumeyaay Indians, present at the time of Cabrillo's landing, lived in small, organized villages. Hunters and gatherers, they subsisted on acorns, berries, and small prey.

land to the politically faithful. The resulting rancho system of land management lasted into the 20th century. Without Spanish trade restrictions, ports were open to all and San Diego became a center for the hide trade.

2 Discovery by Juan Cabrillo (1542)

Cabrillo (*see p27*) was the first European to arrive at San Diego Bay. The Spanish believed that Baja and Alta California were part of a larger island, "Isla California," named after a legendary land in a popular Spanish 15th-century romance. California became part of the Spanish Empire for the next 279 years.

3 The Spanish Settlement (1769)

Fearing the loss of California, Spain sent an expedition, led by Gaspar de Portolá and Franciscan friar Junípero Serra (*see p29*), to establish military posts and missions to Christianize the Indians. Disastrous for the Indians, the settlement survived and a city slowly took hold.

4 Mexico Gains Independence (1821)

After gaining independence, Mexico secularized the California missions and distributed their

5 California Becomes a State (1850)

The Mexican era only lasted until 1848. One bloody battle between the Americans and Californios (*see p40*) was fought at San Pasqual (*see p41*). With a payment of \$15 million and the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, California became part of the US and then later its 31st state.

6 Alonzo Horton Establishes a New City (1867)

Horton realized an investment opportunity to develop a city closer to the water than Old Town. He bought 960 acres for \$265, then sold and gave lots to anyone who could build a brick house. Property values soared, especially after a fire in 1872 in Old Town. "New Town" became today's San Diego.

7 Transcontinental Railroad Arrives (1885)

Interest was renewed in San Diego when the Transcontinental Railroad finally reached town. Real estate speculators poured in, infrastructure was built, and



the future looked bright. However, Los Angeles appeared even more promising, and San Diego's population, which had risen from 5,000 to 40,000 in two years, shrank to 16,000.

8 Panama-California Exposition (1915–16)

To celebrate the opening of the Panama Canal and draw economic attention to the first US port of call on the West Coast, Balboa Park (see pp14–15) was transformed into a brilliant attraction. Fair animals found homes at the zoo (see pp16–17) and Spanish-Colonial buildings became park landmarks.

9 California-Pacific Exposition (1935–36)

A new Balboa Park exposition was launched to help alleviate effects of the Great Depression. The architect Richard Requa designed buildings inspired by Aztec, Mayan, and Pueblo Indian themes.

10 World War II

The founding of the aircraft industry, spurred by the presence of Ryan Aviation and Convair, gave San Diego an enduring industrial base. After Pearl Harbor, the headquarters of the Pacific Fleet moved here. The harbor was enlarged, and hospitals, camps, and housing transformed the city's landscape.

Top 10 Famous San Diego Figures

1 Father Luis Jayme (1740–75)

California's first martyr died in an Indian attack (see p29).

2 Richard Henry Dana (1815–82)

Author of the 19th-century classic *Two Years Before the Mast*, a historical record of early San Diego (see p23).

3 William Heath Davis (1822–1909)

This financier (see p8) established a new settlement known as "Davis' Folly".

4 Alonzo Horton (1813–1909)

The "Father" of San Diego successfully established the city's present location in 1867.

5 Wyatt Earp (1848–1929)

The gunman (see p8) owned saloons and gambling halls in the Gaslamp Quarter.

6 John D. Spreckels (1853–1926)

A generous philanthropist, businessman (see p25), and owner of Hotel del Coronado.

7 L. Frank Baum (1856–1919)

Baum (see p24) lived in and considered Coronado an "earthly paradise."

8 Charles Lindbergh (1853–1926)

The first to fly solo across the Atlantic in 1927 (see p25).

9 Theodore Geisel (1904–91)

Best known as Dr. Seuss, he lived and worked in La Jolla.

10 The San Diego Chicken (b. 1953)

The chicken-suited antics of Ted Giannoulas have brought international attention to San Diego sports and events.



Dr. Seuss was the author of the children's classics *The Cat in the Hat* and *Green Eggs and Ham*.

TOP 10 Historic Sites**1 Ballast Point**

In 1542, while Kumeyaay Indians waited on a beach at Ballast Point, Juan Cabrillo (*see pp27*) stepped ashore and claimed the land for Spain. In 1803, the "Battle of San Diego Bay" took place here, after Spanish Fort Guijarros fired on an American brig in a smuggling incident.

2 Old Town

After Mexico won its independence from Spain in 1821, retired soldiers and their families moved downhill from the presidio, built homes, and opened businesses. An open trade policy attracted others to settle, and by the end of the decade, 600 people lived in Old Town – San Diego's commercial and residential center until 1872.

3 Presidio Hill

Spain established its presence in California atop this hill, and Father Serra founded the first mission (*see pp28–9*) here. During the Mexican-American War in 1846, possession of an earthwork fortress on the hill changed hands three times between the Americans and Californios. 📍 Map P5

4 Mission San Diego de Alcalá

Originally built on Presidio Hill in 1769, this mission moved up the valley a few years later. The first of 21 missions, it was the

birthplace of Christianity in California. It was the only mission to be attacked by Indians. In 1847, the US Cavalry occupied the grounds (*see pp28–9*).

5 Gaslamp Quarter

Filled with late-19th century Victorian architecture, this premiere historic site was once the commercial heart of Alonzo Horton's (*see pp38–9*) New Town. When development moved north to Broadway, the neighborhood succumbed to gambling halls and brothels. It was revitalized in the 1970s (*see pp8–9*).

6 Lindbergh Field

San Diego International Airport (*see p85*) is popularly called after Charles Lindbergh (*see p39*), who began the first leg of his trans-Atlantic crossing from here in 1927. The US Army Air Corps drained the surrounding marshland, took over the small airport, and enlarged the runways to accommodate the heavy bomber aircraft manufactured in San Diego during World War II. 📍 Map C5



7 Border Field State Park

The Mexican-American War concluded with the signing of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo (see p38) on February 2, 1848. A US and Mexican Boundary Commission then determined the new international border between the two countries, with California divided into Alta and Baja. A marker placed in 1851 on a bluff in this park (see p87) marks the farthest western point of the new border. 📍 Map E3 • (619) 428-3034 • Open 9:30am–5pm daily

8 San Pasqual Battlefield State Historic Park

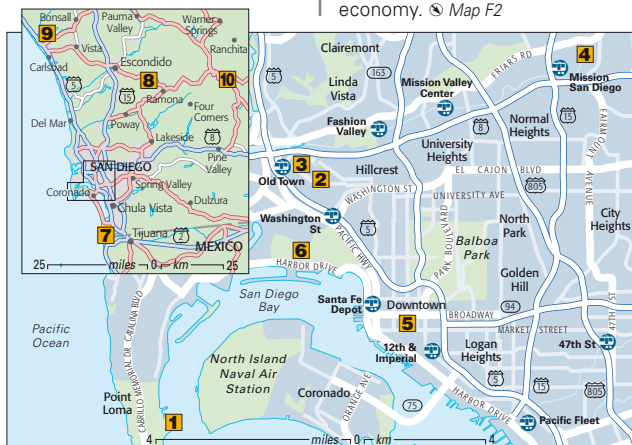
On December 6, 1846, an army of volunteer Mexican-Californian ranchers, known as Californios, defeated the invading American army of dragoons in one of the bloodiest battles of the Mexican-American War. Though the Californios won the battle, they subsequently lost the war, and California became part of the US. 📍 Map E2 • 15808 San Pasqual Valley Rd, Escondido

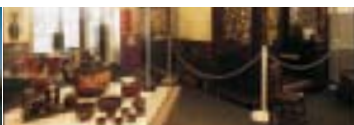
9 Mission San Luis Rey de Francia

Nicknamed the “King of Missions” for its size, wealth, and vast agricultural estates, this mission is the largest adobe structure in California. The Franciscan padres Christianized 3,000 Indians here. After secularization, the mission fell into disrepair and was used for a time as military barracks. Now restored to its former glory, the Franciscan Order administers the mission (see p95).

10 Julian

The discovery of gold in the hills northeast of San Diego in 1870 was the largest strike in Southern California. For five years miners poured into the town of Julian (see p96), which would have become the new county seat if San Diego supporters had not plied the voters of Julian with liquor on election day. The gold eventually ran out, but not until millions of dollars were pumped into San Diego's economy. 📍 Map F2

TOP 10 Museums & Art Galleries

1 Museums of Balboa Park

Housed in stunning structures of Spanish-Colonial, Mayan, and Aztec designs that are architectural treasures in their own right, exhibits at these acclaimed museums constantly change, making Balboa Park (see pp14–15) a year-round attraction. Enjoy the exhibits of fine art, photography, aerospace, anthropology, model trains, and much more (see pp18–19).

2 Museum of Contemporary Art

The most important contemporary art trends are presented at this museum. Docent-led tours, lectures, and special family nights make art accessible to all. The museum's flagship facility (see p32) is at the former oceanfront home of Ellen Browning Scripps (see p33), with a satellite location downtown (see pp72–3).

3 San Diego Maritime Museum

This museum pays tribute to the men and ships that so influenced the history and life of San Diego. Fascinating permanent and temporary exhibitions educate and entertain, while anchored ships can be boarded and explored. ☎ Map G3 • 1492 N. 4 San Diego Chinese Historical Museum

Artifacts such as ceramics, bone toothbrushes, and old photographs document a fascinating slice of San Diego's history in this Spanish-style building that once served as a Chinese mission. Of special note is the ornate bed that once belonged to a Chinese warlord. In the back garden, a gate leads to a small waterfall and koi pond. ☎ Map J5 • 404 3rd Ave • (619) 338-9888 • Adm

5 Tasende Gallery

This gallery presents international contemporary artists. Discover the colorful works of Gaudi-influenced artist Niki de Saint Phalle, the pen-and-ink drawings of Mexico's José Luis Cuevas, the bronze sculptures of Britain's

Lynn Chadwick, and the surrealist paintings of Chilean Roberto Matta. ☎ Map N2 • 820 Prospect St, La Jolla • (858) 454-3691

6 Alcala Gallery

Early Californian Impressionist art is well represented here by the landscapes of Charles A. Fries. This gallery also specializes in ancient pre-Columbian art, Oceanic and African ethnographic art, porcelain, and sculptures. 7 David Zapf Gallery

This fine arts gallery specializes in San Diego artists. Exhibitions feature paintings, drawings, photography, sculptures, and custom furniture from artists such as Mario Uribe, Gail Roberts, Paul Henry, and Johnny Coleman. The glowing, spiritual landscapes of Nancy Kittredge merit special notice. Map H2 • 2400 Kettner Blvd • (619) 232-5004

8 Michael J. Wolf Fine Arts

The oldest gallery in the Gaslamp Quarter features works of emerging US and international contemporary artists. Notice the surrealist acrylics of Filia, the urban landscapes of Luigi Rocca, and the mixed media paintings of Josue Castro, who is inspired by the magic and colors of the Zapotecan culture of Oaxaca. 9 Fingerhut Gallery

This gallery showcases the etchings and lithographs of masters such as Rembrandt, Chagall, and Picasso. Also featured are the brilliant

serigraphs of Jiang, one of the founders of the Hunan school of painting, and works by La Jolla's own Theodore Geisel (*see p39*). Other artists represented are Peter Max, Joanna Zjawinska, Mackenzie Thorpe, and V. Montesinos. Map P2 • 1205 Prospect St, La Jolla • (800) 774-2278

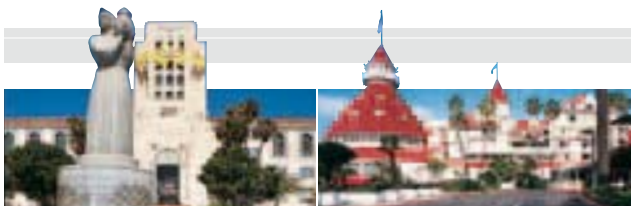

TOP 10 Architectural Highlights

1 San Diego County Administration Center

Four architects responsible for San Diego's look collaborated on this civic landmark. What began as a Spanish-Colonial design evolved into a more "Moderne" 1930s style with intricate Spanish tile work and plaster moldings on the tower. Map H3 • 1600 Pacific Hwy • Open 8am–5pm Mon–Fri

2 California Building & Tower

Bertram Goodhue designed this San Diego landmark for the California-Panama Exposition of 1915–16, using Spanish Plateresque, Baroque, and Rococo details. The geometric tile dome imitates Spanish Moorish ceramic work. An iron weather vane in the shape of a Spanish ship tops the 200-ft (61-m) tower (see p15). Map L1

3 Mormon Temple

The temple of the Church of the Latter Day Saints is an ornate, futuristic structure. The golden trumpet-playing angel, Moroni, crowns one of towers and points the way to Salt Lake City. Interiors are closed to the public. Map B1 • 7474 Charmant Dr, La Jolla

4 El Cortez

This landmark was once the tallest building and most famous hotel in

downtown San Diego. A glass elevator once led to the romantic Sky Room. Ornate Spanish details decorate the reinforced concrete structure, which is now a private apartment building.

5 Hotel del Coronado

Designed by James and Merritt Reid in 1887, this hotel was once the largest in the US to be built entirely of wood. Advanced for its time, the hotel had running bathroom water, telephones, and a birdcage elevator (see p24). Map C6

6 Geisel Library

Named for famed children's author, Dr. Seuss (see p39), and designed by William Pereira, tiers of glass walls are supported by reinforced concrete cantilevers. Filmmakers have used the library as a backdrop for sci-fi television shows. Map B1 • UCSD: see p33

7 Salk Institute

At one of the most famous buildings in San Diego (see p33), twin six-story laboratories comprised of teak panels, concrete and glass stand across from each other, separated by a smooth marble courtyard with a channel of water running down the middle. Note architect Louis Kahn's use of "interstitial" space:

8 Louis Bank of Commerce
Builders of the Hotel del Coronado, the Reid brothers can also take credit for one of the architectural treasures of the Gaslamp Quarter, a stately, four-storey twin-towered Victorian structure (*see p8*). Built in 1888, it was San Diego's first granite building. Of special merit are the ornate bay windows that project from the façade. 📍 *Map K5*

9 Horton Plaza
Inside Horton Plaza is a wonderful hodgepodge of bridges and ramped walkways connecting six staggered levels, embellished with towers and cupolas. Its distinctive sherbet color scheme has been copied on many renovation projects throughout San Diego (*see p48*).

10 Cabrillo Bridge
Built as an entryway to the 1915–16 California-Panama Exposition, this cantilevered and multiple-arched bridge has a 1,500-ft (457-m) span. The best view of the bridge, especially during Christmas, is from the 163 Freeway below. 📍 *Map K1*

Top 10 Public Art Sights

1 Guardian of Water
A 23-ft (70-m) high granite sculpture depicts a pioneer woman. 📍 *Map H3*

2 Horton Plaza Fountain
Flowing water and electric lights were a technological breakthrough in 1909. Bronze plaques honor city notables. 📍 *Map J5*

3 Tunaman's Memorial
A bronze sculpture of three tunamen casting their lines. 📍 *Map B5*

4 Murals at Chicano Park
Pylons of the Coronado Bridge are canvases for 40 murals exploring Hispanic history. 📍 *Map D5*

5 The Cat in the Hat
The Cat in the Hat looks over Dr. Seuss' shoulder in this bronze sculpture. 📍 *Map B1*

6 Surfhenge
Towering surfboards stand in tribute to the surf gods. 📍 *Map E3 • Imperial Beach Pier*

7 Woman of Tehuantepec
A 1,200-lb (544-kg) piece of limestone is sculpted into an Indian woman. 📍 *Map L2 • House of Hospitality*

8 Sun God
A fiberglass bird stretches its wings atop a 15-ft (5-m) concrete arch. 📍 *Map B1*

9 Paper Vortex
A paper airplane is artfully transformed into an Origami crane. 📍 *Map C5 • San Diego International Airport*

10 Homecoming
A bronze sculpture depicts a sailor, wife, and child in a joyous homecoming embrace. 📍 *Map G4 • Navy Pier, Harbor Drive*

TOP 10 Gardens & Nature Reserves

1 Balboa Park
This landmark destination and heart of San Diego offers an array of superb activities. Visit its gardens and museums for inspiration, to play sports, or to watch a concert. Although crowded, Sundays are good days to experience the community at leisure (*see pp14–15*).

2 Mission Bay Park

This aquatic wonderland offers every watersport conceivable. You can also bicycle, play volleyball, jog, or nap on the grass. Excellent park facilities include boat rentals, playgrounds, fire rings, and picnic tables. 🗺 *Map B3*

3 Ellen Browning Scripps Park

Broad lawns shaded by palms and Monterrey cypress trees stretch the cliffs from La Jolla Cove to Children's Pool (*see p53*). Visitors can walk along promenades that offer a stunning view of the cliffs and beach of Torrey Pines. 🗺 *Map N2*

4 Mission Trails Regional Park

At one of the country's largest urban parks, hiking and biking trails wind along rugged hills and valleys. The San Diego River cuts through the middle, and a popular trail leads to the Old Mission

Dam. The energetic can hike up Cowles Mountain, San Diego's highest peak at 1,591 ft (485 m).

5 Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve

Archeologists discovered artifacts of the prehistoric La Jolla culture in this ancient canyon.

You can also explore the adobe home of San Diego's first Mexican land grant family. Between two large coastal canyons, trails lead past woodland, oak trees, chaparral, and a waterfall.

6 Kate O. Sessions Memorial Park

Named in honor of the mother of Balboa Park (*see p19*), this peaceful spot, with a terrific view of Mission Bay (*see p64*), is a popular picnicking area. Take advantage of the ocean breezes to rediscover kite flying. Walking trails extend 2 miles (3 km) through a canyon lined with native coastal sage. 🗺 *Map B3*

7 Torrey Pines State Reserve

A stretch of California's wild coast (*see p33*) offers a glimpse into an ancient ecosystem. Wildflowers bloom alongside hiking trails that lead past rare Torrey pines and 300 other endangered species. Viewing platforms

8 Spreckels Park
Named after John D. Spreckels (see p39), who donated the land, the park hosts Sunday concerts during the summer as well as art and garden shows. An old-fashioned bandstand, shady trees, green lawns, and picnic tables complete the picture of a small-town community center. *Map C6* • Coronado

9 Embarcadero Marina Park
Join the downtown workers for some fresh air and sunshine. Wide grassy areas and benches give you solitude to enjoy the sweeping views of the harbor. During summer, concerts are held on the lawn. *Map J6*

10 Tijuana River National Estuarine Research Reserve
Serene hiking paths meander through fields of wildflowers and native plants. More than 300 species of migratory birds stop by at different times of the year. A visitor center offers information to enhance your visit. *Map E3* • 301 Caspian Way, Imperial Beach

- 1 Point Loma**
The breathtaking view from the peninsula's end takes in the city, harbor and Pacific Ocean (see pp26–7).
- 2 Coronado Bridge**
Coronado, downtown, and San Diego harbor sparkle both day and night. *Map C6*
- 3 Mount Soledad**
San Diego's most glorious view takes in Coronado, Point Loma, downtown, the valleys, and Mission Bay. *Map A2*
- 4 Bertrands at Mr. A's**
Planes on approach to Lindbergh Field make dining a visual affair (see p55).
- 5 Manchester Grand Hyatt San Diego**
The 40th-floor lounge offers views of San Diego Bay and Coronado (see p116).
- 6 Torrey Pines State Reserve**
The view down the wind-eroded cliffs and across the Pacific is magnificent.
- 7 La Valencia Hotel**
A drink on the terrace, overlooking vistas stretching to Torrey Pines, makes the world right (see p115).
- 8 Flying into San Diego**
You can almost see what people are having for dinner as you fly in directly over downtown San Diego.
- 9 Presidio Park**
A panoramic view extends from the freeways in Mission Valley below to Mission Bay and the Pacific (see p80).
- 10 Ferries in San Diego Harbor**
On a sunny day nothing beats a ferry ride on the harbor, gazing at the white sailboats against a blue sky.

TOP 10 Stores & Shopping Centers

1 Horton Plaza
Mervyn's, Macy's, and Nordstrom department stores serve as anchors to this festive shopping experience, a destination in its own right. Designed as an amusement park for shoppers, ramps lead past staggered shopping levels that hold 130 specialty shops, a few restaurants, and movie theaters. 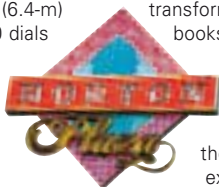

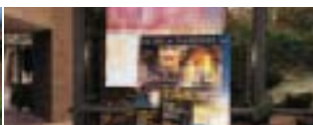

5 Gambling at Indian Casinos

Feeling lucky? Nine tribal casinos promise non-stop Las Vegas-style action and jackpots galore. Starting as a small bingo hall 20 years ago, Indian gaming is now a billion-dollar industry of resort hotels, concert venues, and golf courses. Today, San Diego County has the highest concentration of casinos in the state of California. Thousands of



slot machines, video poker, and gaming tables in immense, striking buildings will satisfy the gambler in you.

You can watch or take part in inflating a brilliantly colored balloon. Hop in the basket and begin to float over the valleys and hills with a glass of champagne in hand. Flights leave early in the morning or at sunset. Most hot-air balloon companies have moved recently to Temecula where there are fewer housing developments to impede their landings.

Just off Mission Beach is the final resting place for the *Yukon*, a decommissioned Canadian warship, the coastguard cutter *Ruby E*, and a barge, all deliberately sunk to create an artificial reef. A research tower here collapsed on its own, with its dangling wires and protrusions only adding to the otherworldly, ethereal atmosphere. Thousands of invertebrate marine life have taken up residence here. Charter boats will take you out. 📍 *Map A4*

10 Vintage Train Rides

Operated by the Railway Museum of San Diego, the Golden State Limited departs twice daily on the weekends from the historic Campo train depot, for a pleasant 16-mile (26-km) round trip to Miller Creek. Between Coronado and Imperial Beach, miles of the "Strand" attracts families with its wide expanses, gentle waves, fire rings, surf fishing, grunion running (*see p53*) and, unique to San Diego beaches, clamming. The name Silver Strand comes from the tiny silver shells that dot the sand on the oceanside. Pedestrian tunnels lead to the beach on the bayside, where the water is warmer and calmer. 📍 *Map E3*

2 Ocean Beach

The laid-back atmosphere of Ocean Beach (*see p85*) attracts locals and some out-of-towners. Surfers usually go out around the pier, and swimmers farther down the beach. There tends to be a strong rip current at the beach, so don't swim out of sight from a lifeguard station. There are plenty of facilities, including showers, picnic tables, and volleyball courts. 📍 *Map A4*

3 Dog Beach

Leashes optional! Your dog can run loose to chase after balls, Frisbees, and other dogs with joyous abandon. The beach is open 24 hours, so you can even come here for a midnight swim. 4 Mission Beach

At this popular beach (*see p97*), sunburned, sandy bodies vie for space upon the sand, volleyballs and Frisbees fly overhead, and skateboarders and cyclists try to balance drinks and portable CD players as they careen

down the boardwalk. If the beach scene gets overwhelming, Belmont Park (*see p52*) is just a block away. 📍 *Map A4*

5 Mission Bay Beaches

Protected from the waves of the Pacific Ocean, 27 miles (43 km) of shoreline, including 19 miles (30 km) of sandy beaches, coves, and inlets, offer idyllic picnic locations. On sunny days, the water is filled with sailboats, kayaks, waterskiers, windsurfers, and rowers. Bike paths wind for miles along the shoreline, and wide grassy areas and ocean breezes make flying kites ideal. 📍 *Map B4*



6 Pacific Beach

A great beach-going spirit fills the air as skateboarders, joggers, and cyclists cruise the promenade that runs parallel to the beach. People-watching opportunities are endless, since Pacific Beach has a reputation of being the place to hang out. Take a walk out to the Crystal Pier Hotel (see p118), past the bungalows to watch surfers shooting the curl. Map A3

7 Windansea Beach

Legendary among surfers for its shorebreaks, this beach found literary fame as the setting for Tom Wolfe's *The Pumphouse Gang*. The beach gets a little wider south of the "Shack," a local landmark, but those with small children should still take care. Map N3

8 La Jolla Shores

A great family beach, but summertime gets crowded as sunbathers, Frisbee-throwers, and boogie-boarders spread out along a broad, sandy white strip lapped by gentle surf. Kellogg Park, which runs alongside part of the beach, is a good picnic area for those who forgot their towels. The La Jolla Underwater Ecological Reserve (see p61) is just offshore, so divers are usually out in the water. Map Q1

9 Black's Beach

This beach is notorious for its nude sunbathers. Access to the beach, which lies between Torrey Pines State Beach and La Jolla Shores, is either down an unstable 300-ft (91-m) cliff or via a 1-mile (1.6-km) walk along the beach from either the north or south during low tide. Surfers find the southern end of the beach ideal, as well as the

hang-gliders who launch off from the cliffs above. Map Q1

10 Torrey Pines State Beach

Miles of sandy beaches and secret coves nestle beneath towering sandstone cliffs. During low tide, tide pools offer a glimpse into life under the sea. Torrey Pines is a San Diego favorite because of its lack of crowds, intimacy, and natural beauty. Parking is available at the Torrey Pines State Reserve (see pp46–7) or by the gliderport on top of the cliff. Map A1

TOP 10 Festivals

1 **Mardi Gras**

Be quick to grab the strings of beads thrown off the floats at the Masquerade Parade. The parade begins in the afternoon at Fifth Avenue, but music and revelry carries on until the early morning. The food booths serve up New Orleans-style Cajun food. 🕒 *Gaslamp Quarter* • Feb

2 **St. Patrick's Day Parade**

A grand parade of marching bands, bagpipes, community organizations, horses, and school groups begins at Sixth and Juniper. Afterwards, an Irish festival takes place at Balboa Park with Irish dancers, lots to eat, green beer, and fun for the entire family. 🕒 *Mar*

3 **Cinco de Mayo**

North of the Mexican border, commemorating the French defeat by Mexican troops is a serious business. Restaurants overflow, Old Town State Historic Park sponsors folkloric ballet performances and mariachi bands, and the Gaslamp Quarter hosts a musical street fair. 🕒 *May*

4 **Fourth of July Fireworks & Parades**

Nearly every San Diego community has its own July 4th festivities, such as fireworks, surfing contests, parades, and street festivals. Since the ban

of home fireworks, commercial fireworks shows are the way to go. The biggest show in the county is held over San Diego Harbor. 🕒 *Jul*

5 **Lesbian and Gay Parade and Festival**

San Diego's gay community hits the streets in celebration of diversity. The parade begins at Fifth Avenue and Laurel in Hillcrest and moves to Balboa Park, where live bands, food booths, and a party atmosphere prevail. Outrageous costumes are the rule of the day. 🕒 *End Jul*

6 **Halloween Festivals & Haunted Houses**

Your worst nightmares may come true at "Frightmare on Market Street," a haunted Victorian building complete with underground catacombs. You might come face to face

with Freddy Krueger, the Texas Chainsaw family, and 13 ghosts at the Haunted Hotel. The Haunted Trails of Balboa Park will scare the wits out of you.

8 Christmas on the Prado

Balboa Park launches the Christmas season by opening its doors to the community. Museums are free after 5pm, carolers sing, and special food booths are set up. The park is closed to traffic, but shuttles reach the outer parking lots. Dress warmly and expect a crowd of over 50,000 people. ☎ *Balboa Park • First Fri & Sat of Dec*

9 Las Posadas

This is a traditional re-enactment of Mary and Joseph seeking shelter for the Christ child. A candlelight procession begins in Heritage Park, passing by historic homes and businesses that have food set out, and finishing at the plaza in Old Town State Historic Park. ☎ *Mid-Dec*

10 Boat Parades of Lights

Yachts and sailboats vie for the title of best decorated in Mission Bay and the San Diego Harbor. The best viewing areas for the Mission Bay parade are at Crown Point and Fiesta Island; for the San Diego Harbor Parade, head to the Embarcadero. ☎ *Dec*

Downtown San Diego

SCARCELY A GENERATION AGO, *one drove through downtown San Diego with the windows rolled up, past derelict tattoo parlors, seedy tenements, and sleazy porn palaces. With vision and dedication, downtown has been transformed into a first-class destination for visitors and a trendy address for residents. Neighborhoods have blossomed with excellent restaurants, art galleries, and festivals; performing arts centers, museums, and a new sports stadium attract visitors by the thousands. The atmosphere is strictly Southern*

Californian: a blend of urban energy and laid-back priorities. Nowadays, drivers fight for cherished parking spaces and casual strolling is the preferred means of transport. From the edge of the Embarcadero, graced with 19th-century sailing ships, to the beautifully restored Victorian and Italianate buildings of the Gaslamp Quarter, a district straight out of the Wild West and home to trattorias, Irish pubs, and a pulsating nightlife, downtown is a great place to have fun in.

1 Gaslamp Quarter

In the mid-19th century, Gaslamp Quarter was the heart of a new city, but within 50 years it had fallen prey to gambling halls, opium dens, and houses of prostitution, and within another 50 years, had become a broken-down slum. Now the Gaslamp Quarter sparkles as it looks to a brilliant future. During the day, the gloriously restored historic buildings, each an architectural highlight, attract history buffs and shoppers. By night, crowds line up to dine in fashionable restaurants, listen to music, or sip the latest martini concoction (*see pp8–9*).

filled with maritime life define this lively district (*see pp10–11*).

3 Balboa Park & San Diego Zoo

Home to the world-famous San Diego Zoo, 15 unique museums, theaters, countless recreational opportunities, and exquisite landscaping, Balboa Park creates an indelible impression. No

matter the time of year,

vibrant flowers bloom in profusion and pepper tree groves and grassy expanses provide idyllic spots for

picnicking. Allow a minimum of a few days to soak in the park's attractions (*see pp14–19*).

4 Horton Plaza

When it opened in 1985, developers kept their fingers crossed that

this unique shopping center would draw visitors to a declining area and help spearhead a downtown revival. An immediate hit, people loved the Plaza's inward-facing design, tiered shopping levels, and the 43 unusual colors of paint on its walls. Covering several city blocks, the plaza features more than 140 shops, movie theaters, and stage productions at the Lyceum Theatre (*see p50*). In the near future, the Balboa Theatre (*see p9*) will be open for live performances (*see p48*).

2 Embarcadero

For those arriving by ship or train, the Embarcadero is San Diego's front door. Passengers disembark from gleaming white cruise ships tied up at B Street Pier or pass through a 1915 train depot, eager to enjoy the city's attractions. But unlike most cities, the Embarcadero is an attraction in itself. Pedestrian-friendly walkways pass by historic sailing ships, museums, shopping centers, and parks. Serious and quirky public art works and a splendid harbor

5 East Village

Formerly a Victorian village that fell into neglect but survived as a warehouse district and artist colony, this is downtown's newest redeveloped area. Petco Park, the 2004 state-of-the-art baseball stadium and home to the San Diego Padres (*see p61*), is the neighborhood's latest focal point. Check out the 1909 Western Metal Supply building: architects incorporated the vintage building into the stadium's structure. A new Children's Museum of San Diego, a new main library, shops, restaurants, artists' lofts, and 4,000 new dwellings are currently under construction. 📍 *Map L5*

6 Little Italy

One of the more recent neighborhoods to undergo revitalization is also one of San Diego's oldest. Genoese fishing families were the first Italians to settle along the waterfront in the 1860s. Along with Portuguese immigrants, they founded San Diego's prosperous tuna industry. Little Italy, sometimes also known as Middletown, has now become a fashionable address. While retaining its Bohemian character, Italian restaurants, antique and design

stores, and hip cafés distinguish its streets. 📍 *Map J3*

7 Asian Pacific Historic District

An eight-block area that overlaps part of the Gaslamp Quarter designates the former center of San Diego's Asian community. The Chinese came to San Diego following the California Gold Rush and took up fishing and construction work; others ran opium dens and gambling halls. Filipinos and Japanese soon followed. This is the home of Chinese New Year celebrations, a farmers' market, and an Asian bazaar. Pick up a walking-tour map at the Chinese Historical Museum (*see p42*), and look out for the Asian architectural flourishes on the buildings you pass by. 📍 *Map J5*

8 Museum of Contemporary Art

A satellite location of the museum in La Jolla (*see p32*), galleries here present rotating exhibits from emerging and established contemporary artists, as well as selected pieces from the museum's permanent collection. Marking the entrance is the 18-ft (5.4-m) *Hammering Man at 3,110,527*, a steel and aluminum sculpture by Jonathan Borofsky. The museum also hosts lectures, workshops, and family activities, including

The Founding of Modern San Diego

When entrepreneur Alonzo Horton arrived in a burgeoning San Diego in 1867, he believed that a new city could prosper in this location. He bought 960 acres and sold and even gave away lots to people. When you walk the Gaslamp Quarter, note the short blocks and lack of alleys, created due to the opinion that corner lots were worth more and alleys only accumulated trash.



the popular “Thursday Night Thing,” where the public can meet and mingle with local artists. 📍 *Map H4 • 1001 Kettner Blvd • (619) 234-1001 • Open 11am–5pm daily • Docent-led tours 2pm Sat*

9 Martin Luther King Promenade

Planner Max Schmidt used the idea of functional public art to create this 1/4-mile (0.4-km) promenade along Harbor Drive. Described as a “serape” of colors, textures, and water-works, the grassy promenade celebrates San Diego’s multi-cultural heritage. Granite stones in the sidewalk bear quotes by civil-rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King. 📍 *Map H5*

10 Villa Montezuma

This whimsical Queen Anne home features a variety of architectural elements, including gables, relief work, and a Baroque tower. Outstanding stained-glass windows depict Shakespeare, Mozart, Beethoven, and St. Cecilia, the patron saint of musicians. Redwood and walnut paneling lines ornate Victorian-era interiors. Operated by the San Diego Historical Society, docents give tours. 📍 *Map M6 • 1925 K St • (619) 239-2211 • Open 10am–4:30pm Fri–Sun • Adm*

A Day Walking Around Downtown

Morning

📍 Start at the **Santa Fe Depot**. Walk right on Broadway, cross the RR tracks, and walk two blocks to Harbor Drive. Turn right and head to the **Maritime Museum** (see p42). Check out the exhibits and climb aboard the **Star of India**. Walk back down Harbor Drive. to the ticket booth for harbor tours. A narrated harbor cruise brings you close to the naval facilities. Next, spend an hour or so aboard the **USS Midway** at the **San Diego Aircraft Carrier Museum** (see pp12–13). Finally, it’s time for lunch at **The Fish Market** (see p54).

Afternoon

Continue down Harbor Drive to **Seaport Village** (see p11) and stay on the sidewalk until you reach a crossing. Turn left; walk up the street past the **Hyatt Hotel**, across Harbor Drive and the trolley tracks. Walk onto the **Martin Luther King Promenade**, which stretches past beautiful downtown apartment revitalizations. At the Convention Center trolley stop, turn left and then right on J St. On J and 3rd, stop by the **San Diego Chinese Historical Museum** (see p42). Turn left on 3rd and right on Island; you’ll pass the historic **Horton Grand Hotel**. At 4th, visit the **William Heath Davis House** (see p8). One block farther is the heart of the **Gaslamp Quarter**. After walking around, treat yourself to a sundae at **Ghiradelli Soda Fountain** at 631 5th Street.

7 San Diego Art Institute Shop

TOP 10 Cruising the Bay

1 Museum Vessels of the Embarcadero

The sailing ship *Star of India* dates back to 1863; *Berkeley* used to carry passengers in the Bay Area; and the USS *Midway* features in the Aircraft Carrier Museum (see pp10–13).

2 SPAWAR

The Navy marine mammal facility trains bottlenose dolphins, with their biological sonar, to locate sea mines. ☎ Map D6

3 Cabrillo National Monument

Dedicated to the European discovery of San Diego and Alta California, this draws over one million people a year. The statue of Cabrillo is a replica of an original that could not withstand the wind and salt air (see p26).

4 Naval Air Station North Island

Three aircraft carriers tie up here. You can often see high-tech aircraft, submarines, and destroyers take off and land (see p25).

5 Local Marine Wildlife

Seals and sea lions are typical residents of the bay. The endangered East Pacific green sea turtle and the California least tern have protected foraging habitats.

6 Coronado Bridge

This distinctive bridge links Coronado to San Diego.

Its gradual incline and curve allows cars to maintain speed, and the bridge sits high enough to allow aircraft carriers to pass beneath at high tide (see p24).

7 32nd Street Naval Station

This station provides shore support and living quarters for over 50 naval ships of the Pacific Fleet, and is one of only two major fleet support installations in the country. ☎ Map D6

8 NASSCO Shipyard

The National Steel and Shipbuilding Company designs and builds US Navy auxiliary ships, commercial tankers, and container ships. It is one of the largest shipyards in the US. ☎ Map D6

9 Naval Amphibious Base

Home to the Navy SEALs and the Navy Parachute Team, the facility has served as an amphibious training base since 1943. The base is responsible for training, maintenance, and crews of 85 ships of the Pacific Fleet (see p25).

10 Kelp & Seaweed Processing Factory

The kelp forests off San Diego's coast provide valuable resources for Kelco, the largest kelp harvester in California. The company produces 70 different products from kelp, including stabilizers used in everything from salad dressing and ice cream to beer and car wax. ☎ Map D6

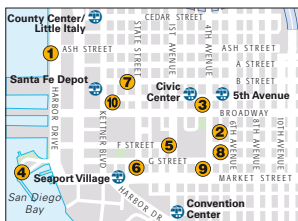

Old Town, Uptown, & Mission Valley

THIS LONG STRETCH follows the San Diego River from the Mission San Diego de Alcalá to Old Town. Over 200 years ago, Kumeyaay Indians lived in tribal groups within small settlements in the valley. Unknown to them, strangers from the other side of the earth would change their lives forever.

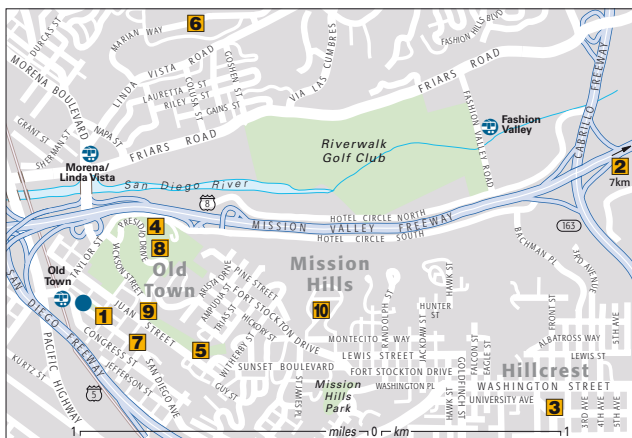
Spanish soldiers and Franciscan padres would have their time of glory here, as well as San Diego's pioneer families. Today, the valley itself holds little interest beyond masses of chain motels and shopping centers intersected by a freeway; however, on the bluffs above, you'll find eclectic neighborhoods overflowing with charm, brilliant architecture, and chic restaurants. Tolerance and diversity creates a progressive, Bohemian air, while rising real estate prices have turned simple bungalow homes into showpieces. And San Diego's birthplace is always close by.

Old Town Plaza, State Historic Park

1 Old Town State Historic Park

San Diego's first commercial settlement has been either preserved or re-created in this pedestrian-only park. Although much of the town was destroyed in a fire in 1872, prompting the development of a new town center closer to the water, several of the original structures still remain. You can wander into any of Old Town's houses and find museums or concession shops inside, or enjoy one of the park's many Mexican restaurants (*see pp22–3*).

2 Mission San Diego de Alcalá

A peaceful enclave among the nondescript strip malls of Mission Valley, the mission's original spirit still lingers in the church and its lovely gardens. The first of California's 21 missions was moved to this permanent site only a few years after its founding. Over the years, the structure was reconstructed to suit the needs of the time, transforming it from a simple mission to a fortress with 5- to 7-ft (1.5- to 2-m) thick adobe brick walls. Its famous façade and bell tower have inspired architects to copy the "Mission Style" throughout San Diego (*see pp28–9*).

3 Hillcrest

Considered San Diego's first suburb in the 1920s, Hillcrest

slowly developed into a residential area, offering a quiet alternative to the bustle of downtown. A trolley stop opened the neighborhood up to thriving businesses, restaurants, and theaters; in the 1940s merchants proudly erected a sign that spanned University Boulevard, proclaiming "Hillcrest" to the world. But fortunes changed, neglect followed, and the sign came down. In the 1970s, the gay and lesbian community took up the revitalization challenge and transformed the community into a hip destination with fabulous restaurants, nightlife, and avant garde shops. And the sign is back – in neon. Map C4

4 Junípero Serra Museum

Constructed in 1929 in keeping with the city's Spanish-Colonial heritage, white stucco arches, narrow passages, a red-tile roof, and a stately tower pay tribute to the first mission, which stood near this site. The San Diego Historical Society oversees the museum, which is dedicated to the city's earliest days. Artifacts from ongoing archeological excavations at the presidio, ceramics made by Kumeyaay Indians, clothing, furniture, and a cannon help illustrate the meager life people led. Climb the tower to compare today's view with that of 1929.

5 Heritage Park

Downtown's rapid expansion after World War II almost destroyed several Victorian heritage houses and San Diego's first synagogue. The Save Our Heritage Organization rescued and moved these architectural treasures to this specially-created park. Of notable interest is the Sherman Gilbert House, once home to art and music patrons Bess and Gertrude Gilbert, who hosted luminaries such as Artur Rubinstein, Anna Pavlova, and the Trapp Family Singers. Bronze plaques describe the houses' former lives.

6 University of San Diego

Grand Spanish Renaissance buildings distinguish this independent Catholic university, its design inspired by the university in the Spanish town of Alcalá de Henares. Of exceptional note is the Founders Chapel with its white marble altar, gold-leaf decoration, 14 stained-glass nave windows, and marble floor. The campus is known for the Joan B. Kroc School of Peace Studies and its programs in law, education, nursing, and engineering. 📍 Map C4 • 5998 Alcalá Park

Apolinaria Lorenzana

In 1800, Apolinaria Lorenzana and 20 orphans arrived from Mexico to be distributed to respectable presidio families. She taught herself to write by copying every written thing she found. She spent her life caring for the mission padres, teaching children and women church doctrine, and tending the sick. Nicknamed La Beata, she was one of the few women to receive a land grant.

7 Whaley House

California's first two-story brick structure also served as San Diego's first courthouse, county seat, and home to Thomas Whaley, who built this house in 1856 over a graveyard and site of a former gallows.

Considered one of the most haunted in America, the US Commerce Department declared the house officially haunted in the 1960s.

8 Presidio Park

Kumeyaay Indians once used this hillside for sacred ceremonies. Site of the original Spanish presidio and mission settlement, a lovely park is all that's left of San Diego's beginnings. The park contains the Serra Museum (see p79) and the remaining earthen walls of Fort Stockton, a fortress that changed hands several times during the Mexican-American War, commemorated by bronze monuments, a flagpole, and a cannon. The 28-ft (8.5-m) Serra Cross, constructed from mission tiles, honors Father Junípero Serra (see p29). 📍 Map P5

9 Mormon Battalion Memorial Visitor's Center

In July 1846, 500 men, 32 women, and 51 children set out from Council Bluffs, Iowa, on what would be considered one of the longest military marches in history. Six months and 2,000 miles (3,218 km) later, they arrived in San Diego to offer support to the American military garrison during the Mexican-American War. At the Visitor's Center, a volunteer from the Church of Latter-Day Saints will discuss the historic march and Mormon contributions to San Diego and California. 📍 *Map P5* • 2510 Juan St • Open 9am–9pm daily

10 Mission Hills

One of San Diego's most charming and romantic neighborhoods is tucked in the hills overlooking Old Town and San Diego Bay. Tree-lined streets run past architectural jewels built in Craftsman, Mission Revival, Italian Renaissance, and Victorian style. Dating from the early 20th-century, homes had to cost at least \$3,500, and could not keep any male farm animals. Commercial development was restricted, and only those of Caucasian descent could hold property. Still here is Kate Sessions' 1910 nursery (*see p19*). 📍 *Map Q5* • Mission Hills Nursery: 1525 Fort Stockton Dr

A Walk Around Old Town, Heritage Park, & Presidio Park

Morning

Begin at the **Old Town Transportation Center**. Cross the street and follow the path into **Old Town State Historic Park**. Just to the left is the **Visitor's Center**, where you can pick up a map. Walk along the right side of the Plaza and peek into the **U.S. Apothecary Shoppe**. Follow the signs to the **Casa de Machado-Stewart** and the **Mason Street School** (*see p23*). Back at the Plaza, visit the **La Casa de Estudillo** (*see p22*) for the best insight into an upper-class home of early California. From the Plaza's southwest corner, continue out of the State Park. Walk along San Diego Avenue, where you'll find souvenir shops, galleries, and restaurants. Try the **Old Town Mexican Café** (*see p83*) for lunch.

Afternoon

Cross the street at Conde and backtrack up San Diego Avenue to visit the haunted **Whaley House**. Turn right on Harney Street and walk uphill to **Heritage Park**. Backtrack one block to the **Mormon Battalion Visitor's Center**. Turn right on Juan Street and walk to Mason. You'll see a sign indicating "The Old Presidio Historic Trail". Turn right on Mason, follow the golf course to Jackson, and look for the footpath across the street. You'll parallel Jackson to the left and wind uphill to **Presidio Park**. Across the grass are the ruins of the original presidio, the **Serra Cross**, and the **Serra Museum**.

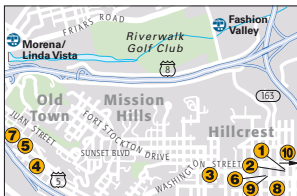

Southern San Diego

SOUTH OF SAN DIEGO *to the Mexican border, cultures blend irrevocably. Many Mexican citizens live, work in, and send their children to school in communities such as Chula Vista and National City. Likewise, many Americans live in the beach towns south of Tijuana, taking advantage of cheaper housing and medical care. And people flood both ways across the border to shop, to be entertained, and to pursue a livelihood. Vast stretches of empty beaches are protected nature preserves where one can hike and discover abundant wildlife. Beach towns devote themselves to the surf culture, while exclusive Coronado boasts one of the most prized zip codes in the country.*

Coronado

In the 1880s, two wealthy businessmen, Elisha Babcock, Jr. and Hampton Story, purchased Coronado and set out to build a town. They sold lots, laid streets, and constructed the landmark Hotel del Coronado (*see p115*). John D. Spreckels (*see p39*) soon bought them out and turned Coronado into a haven for old-money gentry. The military permanently took over much of the peninsula during World War I. The old mansions, resorts, and military base exist harmoniously and give Coronado its unique identity (*see pp24–5*).

2

Point Loma

Over one million people a year visit the Cabrillo National Monument at Point Loma. The views are simply mesmerizing, and the peninsula ends at the meeting point of the Pacific Ocean and San Diego Bay. Half the peninsula is occupied by the military, which has prevented over-development. Spend time at Sunset Cliffs Park to experience the wind and sea and perhaps spot a whale (*see pp26–7*).

3

Tijuana

During the days of Prohibition, Tijuana used to be the destination of choice for the Hollywood elite and their followers, and for alcohol and gambling. The palatial, Moorish-designed Agua Caliente Casino & Spa (*see p35*) was so popular that it boasted its own landing airstrip for the private planes of the wealthy. Fortunes fell when Mexico declared casino gambling illegal in 1935. US Navy servicemen soon added to Tijuana's reputation at the bars on Avenida Revolución, but nowadays, the city has cleaned

up its image considerably. Take the time and you'll find culture and great food in Mexico's fourth largest city (*see pp34–5*).

4

Ocean Beach

Unconventional and laid back, OB, as it's locally known, still has a somewhat hippie-like feel from the 1970s. On Newport Avenue, its main thoroughfare, you can still find a few original head shops. But OB is mainly about the beach: on any day of the year, surfers are next to the pier waiting for the next swell; volleyball players are spiking balls over the net; and dogs and their owners are running freely on Dog Beach (*see p64*).

5

San Diego International Airport

No matter where you are in San Diego, look up and you'll see a jet soaring dramatically past the downtown high-rises on its final approach to Lindbergh Field (*see p40*) as locals call the airport. A 100 years ago, this area was a muddy wasteland that proved to be an ideal spot for budding inventors and pilots to try out their latest machines. In 1927, Ryan Aviation (*see p39*) designed, produced, and tested on the beach the *Spirit of St. Louis*, the historic plane that Charles Lindbergh piloted solo across the Atlantic. 🗺 *Map C5*

6 Shelter Island

Not really an island but a peninsula that juts out into San Diego Bay from Point Loma, the “island” is home to thousands of pleasure boats and a park that stretches along its length. In the 1950s, the city dredged millions of tons of sand and mud from the bay onto a sandbar to create land for marinas and hotels. A number of hotels still have hints of Polynesian themes, a popular style at the time. At the entrance to Shelter Island is the San Diego Yacht Club, the three-time host of the prestigious America’s Cup sailing race. Map B5

7 Harbor Island

Created from 3.5 million tons of mud scooped from the bottom of San Diego Bay, this recreational island is another peninsula that extends into the bay south from the airport. Hotels, restaurants, and marinas take advantage of the gorgeous views across the bay of downtown, Point Loma, and Coronado. Facing the island along the waterfront is Spanish Landing Park, which commemorates the 1769 meeting of the sea and land expeditions of Gaspar de Portolá and Junípero Serra (see p29) which permanently brought the Spanish to California. Map B5

8 Marine Corps Recruit Depot

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the quaint Spanish-Colonial buildings were designed by Bertram Goodhue, architect of several buildings for the Panama-California Exposition in Balboa Park (see pp14–15). The Command Museum displays the history and traditions of the Marine Corps in Southern California and the wars in which they fought. Exhibits include photos, paintings, training films, weapons, and a World War II ambulance and jeep. Map B4

Tent City

When John D. Spreckels acquired ownership of the Hotel del Coronado in 1890, he felt the beauty of the area should be available to everyone. He built “Tent City,” a makeshift town that catered to the less-well-to-do. Arriving by rail and car, families paid \$4.50 a week to live in tents equipped with beds, dressers, and flush toilets. Amenities included carnival booths, Japanese gardens, a library, and children’s bull fights. At its peak, the town held 10,000 visitors. The tents came down by 1939, when they could no longer compete with the rising popularity of the roadside motel.



9 Border Field State Park
As the endangered Western snowy plover seeks a place in which to lay her fragile eggs, the green-and-white vehicles of the US Border Patrol swoop down hillsides, lights blazing, in search of the illegal immigrant. An enormous, rusty, corrugated metal fence, which separates the US and Mexico, slices through the park before plunging into the sea. This southern part of the Tijuana River National Estuarine Research Reserve (see p47) attracts nature lovers who come to hike, ride horses, picnic on the beach, and birdwatch. On the Mexican side of the fence is a lively Mexican community and bullring (see p41).

10 Chula Vista Nature Center
The center is located in the Sweetwater Marsh National Wildlife Refuge, one of the few salt marshes left on the Pacific Coast. Rent some binoculars and climb to an observation deck to see how many of the 200 bird species that inhabit the refuge you can spot. Or you can also take a self- or ranger-guided tour along interpretative trails. Children will enjoy petting bat rays and leopard sharks. The parking lot is located near the Baysite/E Street Trolley Station; a free shuttle will take you to the center. Map E3

A Bike Ride Around Coronado

Morning

Begin at **Bikes & Beyond** (see p60) at the **Ferry Landing Market Place**. Walk to the sidewalk facing the harbor and enjoy the city view. Pedestrians and joggers also use this sidewalk, so proceed cautiously. Around the corner, you'll face the **Coronado Bridge** (see p24); the bougainvillea-covered walls on the right mark the **Marriott Resort** (see p114). Information boards on the way depict harbor wildlife and a map indicates the various navy yards. Under the bridge, the path turns away from the water. At the street, bear left and cross over. There is no protected bike path, but traffic is light on Glorietta Bay Drive. At the marina, the road will fork; take the lower road to the left. Turn right at the stop-light and get off your bike; bike riding is forbidden on Orange Avenue. At 1025 Orange Avenue, **Moo Time Creamery** serves delicious homemade ice cream and smoothies. Walk your bike back to **Hotel del Coronado** (see p24) and check out the shops on its lower level (see p90). Leaving the hotel, bear left to Ocean Avenue; the Pacific Ocean is on the left and several 100-year-old mansions on the right. Turn right on Alameda and ride through a typical Coronado neighborhood with Spanish-style houses and bungalows. At 4th, cross the street and walk one block; the **Naval Air Station** will be on your left. Turn right on 1st. It's a straight stretch back to the Market Place.

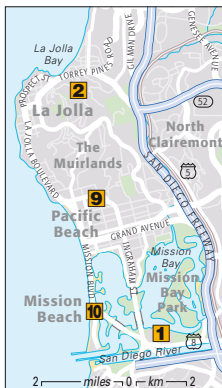

1 SeaWorld

Since 1964, SeaWorld has introduced over 100 million guests to marine life, with more than 30 attractions, exhibits, and shows. The park has recently introduced a few thrill rides to compete with the numerous Southern California adventure parks. You can don a wetsuit and enter the dolphin pool in the Dolphin Interaction Program, or participate in Trainer For A Day, where you learn what it takes to be a killer whale and dolphin trainer. SeaWorld also hosts sleepovers, resident, and day camps (*see pp30–31*).

2 La Jolla

Spectacular and rich, with a gorgeous location and elegant restaurants and shops, this is an ideal destination. However, La Jollans do not sit around idly basking in their good fortune. Just north of the village along Torrey Pines Drive, some of the most prestigious research institutions in the world, many underwritten by La Jolla's residents, contribute to the good of humanity. Across the freeway, an area known as the Golden Triangle has become the new telecommunications Silicon Valley (*see pp34–5*).

3 San Diego Wild Animal Park

Many people prefer the Wild Animal Park to its sister zoo in Balboa Park (*see pp16–17*). By mono-rail or a circuitous hiking trail, experience African and Asian animals roaming freely in enormous enclosures that replicate their natural environment. For the ultimate close-up encounter, reserve a spot on the photo

caravan where an open-air truck takes you into the animal habitats. A successful breeding program has brought 125 cheetahs, 142 rhinos, and nearly extinct California condors and Arabian oryxes into the world.

4 Mission San Luis Rey de Francia

Named after canonized French king Louis IX, this mission was the last to be established in Southern California.

Franciscan padres oversaw enormous tracts of land devoted to cattle, sheep, and horses, and a Native American population of 2,800. Relations between the missionaries and the indigenous population were so successful that when Father Peyri was ordered by the Mexican government to return to Spain in 1832, the Native Americans followed him to San Diego Harbor.

Today's restored mission offers displays on life and artifacts of the mission era. Still administered by Franciscan Friars, the mission offers popular retreats.

5 Temecula Wine Country

During the mission days, Franciscan friars recognized that San Diego's soil and climate were ideal for planting grape vines. However, it wasn't until the 1960s that wine was first produced commercially. Now over a dozen wineries stretch across rolling hills studded with oak trees, most of them along Rancho California Road. Wineries offer tastings for a small fee, and many of them operate restaurants and delis. Two of the most popular wineries in the area are Thornton Winery and Callaway Vineyard & Winery.

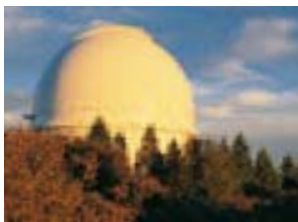

6 Julian

When Fred Coleman discovered gold here in 1869, scores of prospectors poured into the region. The boom was over in less than five years, but some stayed on in this charming little community surrounded by oak and pine forests high in the Cuyamaca Mountains. Now this designated Historical District is filled with B&Bs, and is a popular weekend getaway. Julian is also well-known for its apple orchards (*see p41*).

7 Anza-Borrego Desert State Park

Fantastic geological formations, archeological sites, and sweeping desert vistas are only a backdrop for the wildlife found in the largest state park in the continental US. Golden eagles soar above, roadrunners dart across the paths, and bighorn sheep dot the mountainsides.

In springtime a dazzling array of wildflowers create a magic show of colors across the desert. Stop by the visitor center to pick up a map that marks hiking trails, sites of Native American pictographs, and the park's best viewpoints. 📍 Map F2

8 Palomar Observatory

High atop one of North County's highest mountains, the dome of the observatory has an otherworldly look. Part of the California Institute of Technology, Palomar is home to the 200-inch (508-cm) Hale Telescope, the largest optical instrument of its kind when installed in 1947. Its moving parts weigh 530 tons, the mirror 14.5 tons. Thanks to computer technology, no one

Brain Power

Beneath San Diego's image of "fun in the sun" is one of the country's most highly educated populations. San Diego has the most PhDs per capita in the nation, 30 percent hold college degrees, and 20 percent of the county's adults are involved in higher education. La Jolla boasts some of the most prestigious research facilities: the Salk Institute, Scripps Research Institute, Scripps Institution of Oceanography, and UCSD.



“looks” through the telescope anymore; however, the Reuben H. Fleet Science Center (*see p52*) runs summer programs which utilize the 60-inch (152-cm) telescope. *Map E1*

9 Pacific Beach

Residents here enjoy an endless summer climate and an easy-going lifestyle. Life revolves around Garnet Avenue, lined with nightclubs, cafés, late-night restaurants, and shops. The street ends at the 1927 Crystal Pier, a great location to watch the surfers below, catch a fish, or spend the night in a tiny cottage. Come early to claim a fire ring on the beach and cook up some marshmallows, or bicycle along the boardwalk to Mission Beach (*see p65*).

10 Mission Beach

The California beach scene struts in full glory along a narrow strip of land filled with vacation rentals and beachwear shops. Skaters, cyclists, and joggers whiz along the Strand, while surfers, volleyball devotees, and sun worshippers pack the sand. Sometimes the streets become so crowded on the Fourth of July weekend that the police have to shut the area down. A block away, Belmont Park (*see p52*) is an old-fashioned fun zone with bumper car rides and a vintage roller coaster (*see p64*).

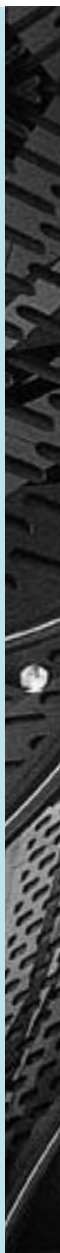


Mission Beach

A Walk in La Jolla

Morning

Begin by looking out the front door of the landmark **Hotel La Valencia** (*see p115*). Turn left onto Prospect Street and walk past restaurants and art galleries. Before you reach Coast Boulevard, a stairway to the left leads to the **Sunny Jim Cave**. Steps lead through a tunnel into a fascinating, ocean-carved cave, named by L. Frank Baum (*see p39*). To the left of the entrance a platform overlooks the caves. Continue along Coast Boulevard, admiring views of **Torrey Pines** and **Scripps Pier**. Pass through **Ellen Browning Scripps Park** (*see p46*). Beyond the end of the park is **Children's Pool** (*see p53*). Check out the seals and sea lions. Turn left on Cuvier Street and left onto Prospect Street. You'll now be at the **Museum of Contemporary Art** (*see p32*). Check out the latest exhibit or have a snack in the café. Louis Gill designed the museum and the older architecture in this area. Walk back toward the village and peek inside **John Cole's Books**; the cottage dates back to 1904. Cross Prospect at Fay but keep on Prospect. Pass through the Arcade Building to Girard Avenue. Turn right and window-shop along La Jolla's main street. Of note is **Warwick's** at 7812, a stationer and bookstore, and **La Jolla Fiber Arts** (*see p99*). Cross the street at Torrey Pines Road and double back on Girard. Time to enjoy delicious seafood sandwiches and light French entrées at **My Place**, 7777 Girard.

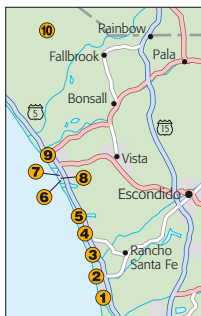

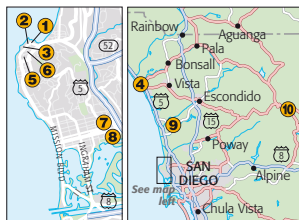

For 10 Planning Your Trip

1 Tourist Offices

Multilingual staff at the International Visitors Information Center can answer queries on activities and accommodation, and also sell tickets to attractions. Ask for a copy of the *Official Visitors Pocket Guide*. The Mission Bay Visitor Information Center is handy if you're driving on the I-5 and need help with accommodation. The Coronado Visitors Center can give you a map of Coronado and suggest activities in the area.

2 Media

The *San Diego Reader* is the best source of the latest happenings in town. You'll find restaurant reviews, movies and theater timings, and music events. Free copies can be found throughout the city.

3 Internet

Websites offer useful information about package vacations, current events, new attractions, city services, transportation, sports, parks, and restaurants in San Diego.

4 Maps

Maps from the tourist information offices are good for basic sightseeing. To explore San Diego further, Auto Club maps give a good overview, or buy comprehensive street maps of the county published by Thomas Bros.

5 Visas

For visa information, international travelers should check with their embassy or the US Department of State's website. Canadian citizens only need proof of residence. If you're in Tijuana for the day, and your visa has expired or does not allow multiple entries, plan on flying home from Mexico.

6 Insurance

Get comprehensive travel insurance before arriving in the US, or you can expect large bills even if you aren't denied medical care. If renting a car, ensure what your auto insurer and credit card company covers in case of accident or theft. An auto insurance policy is not valid in Mexico; buy Mexican insurance at the border.

7 When to Go

San Diego enjoys the most temperate climate in the nation. The rainy season usually begins in December, with a few large storms rolling in by spring. Winter days can be warm and sunny, but ocean temperatures are cold. Summer showers are mild, and offshore breezes ensure pleasant evenings.

8 What to Take

Casual dress is the rule. Evenings can be cool, so tuck in a sweater or lightweight jacket.

9 How Long to Stay

Depending on your stamina, San Diego's sights can be covered in a week or less. SeaWorld and the Zoo tend to be exhausting all-day affairs, so plan a light day after your visits. Allow a few days to travel up the coast or around the backcountry.

10 Traveling with Children

San Diego is a non-stop kids' playground. Hotels welcome families, although some B&Bs are not set up for children. Many of the larger resorts feature kids programs and can supply names of licensed baby-sitters.

10 Getting to San Diego

1 San Diego International Airport – Lindbergh Field

Most flights land at Terminals 1 and 2, with Southwest Airlines located in Terminal 1. Short flights within Southern California operate from the Commuter Terminal. The only non-stop international flights fly to and from Mexico.

2 Getting into Town

Exiting Terminals 1 and 2, the skybridge links to the Transportation Plaza. Flyer Route 992 is a public bus that departs every 10 minutes and connects with the trolley and Amtrak before continuing up Broadway. Many hotels are only 10 minutes away.

3 Private Shuttles, Taxis, & Limo Services

Door-to-door shuttles are available at the airport's Transportation Plaza. Fares are based on distance and per person. Limo services can meet you in baggage claim. Call ahead to book a pickup to the airport.

4 Aeropuerto Internacional Abelardo L. Rodríguez—Tijuana

Located 5 miles (8 km) east of downtown, frequent flights link Tijuana to the rest of Mexico. Domestic flights within Mexico are often cheaper

than flying internationally from California.

5 Customs

Each person above 21 is allowed one liter of liquor and 200 cigarettes duty free. Citizens may bring in \$400 worth of gifts, non-citizens \$100. Cash exceeding \$10,000 must be declared. Fresh produce, meats, and plants are prohibited.

6 Cruise Ships

All cruise ships moor at B Street Terminal along the Embarcadero on N. Harbor Drive. Ships sail to the Mexican Riviera or do mini-cruises to Ensenada and Catalina.

7 Amtrak Trains

Amtrak's Pacific Surfliners arrive at the historic Santa Fe Depot. Eleven trains travel daily to and from Orange County and Los Angeles, and four continue directly on to Santa Barbara.

8 Greyhound Buses

Greyhound buses operate 24 hours, are air conditioned, cheap, and cover the entire US and most of Canada. There are direct connections to LA, Las Vegas, and Phoenix, and buses from downtown to Tijuana's central bus terminal.

9 Car

From Los Angeles, I-5 passes along coastal towns, heads into downtown, and continues to

the international border. Shortly before La Jolla, I-5 splits with I-805, re-connecting at the border. If coming from the east, I-8 passes through Mission Valley and ends just past SeaWorld. I-15 from Las Vegas serves inland San Diego County.

10 McClellan-Palomar Airport

This airport is useful if visiting North County. Some 30-miles (48-km) north of downtown, United Express flies shuttles to and from Los Angeles, and America West Express connects with Phoenix. Parking is free for up to two weeks.

TOP 10 Getting Around San Diego

1 Trolley

Inexpensive and fun, this light-rail system has two lines. The Blue line travels to the Mission, Mission Valley, Old Town, downtown, and San Ysidro. The Orange line is handy for the Gaslamp Quarter, the Convention Center, and Seaport Village. Tickets are available at station vending machines, and are good for buses too.

2 Buses

Buses connect with the North County Transit District, which serves coastal and inland San Diego County. Fares are payable in exact change as you board. The Transit Store offers maps and the *Way to Go!* brochure, which details how to reach sights by bus.

3 The Coaster

A regional rail service runs between downtown and Oceanside, stopping in Old Town, Sorrento Valley, Solana Beach, Encinitas, Carlsbad, and Oceanside. Trains run Monday to Saturday. Buy tickets at a vending machine and validate them before boarding.

4 Ferry

A fun way to travel to Coronado is on the San Diego–Coronado Ferry. It takes passengers and bicycles only. Buy your ticket at the San Diego Harbor Excursion Dock or the Ferry Landing Market

Place in Coronado.

Ferries leave San Diego at 9am and run hourly until 9pm, Sun–Thu, and an hour later on Friday and Saturday.

5 Cars

You won't need a car if you're only visiting downtown, but it's essential to get quickly around the rest of the city. A few car rental agencies have cars you can drive into Mexico. Don't forget to buy additional insurance at the border.

6 Taxis

Taxis don't cruise for fares. You can usually find one in front of large hotels, the airport, or some shopping centers. Rates are clearly posted on the taxi door; distances in San Diego can make some trips an expensive proposition.

7 Bicycles

San Diego has miles of dedicated bike lanes. Get a copy of Ridelink's San Diego Region Bike Map, available at visitor centers. Bicycles may be taken at the back of trolley cars, or stowed at the front of many buses.

8 Limousines

For a touch of luxury, limousines can be hired for one-way and round-trip transfers, or for the entire day. Drivers can provide you with good insider information.

9 Excursions

Old Town Trolley Tours continually circle Old Town, Seaport Village, Horton Plaza, Balboa Park, the Zoo, and Coronado. You can get on or off all day; the full circuit takes two hours. Contactours offers narrated tours of the city and Southern California theme parks, as well as day trips to Mexico.

10 San Diego Water Taxi

On-call water taxis will transport you to locations around the harbor. Their hours run from 2–10pm Mon–Thu, and until 11pm on Friday and Saturday.

10 Things to Avoid

1 Driving Frustrations

Morning and afternoon rush hour on Interstates is an appalling exercise in futility. A 30-minute drive on the I-5 can take hours. Ask someone at your hotel how to time things, and know your directions well. Parking in Mission Beach or La Jolla can be next to impossible in the summer.

2 Car Theft

San Diego's proximity to the Mexican border makes car theft a concern. Even if your car is found across the border, the paperwork to bring it back is a nightmare. Neighborhoods prone to theft include Pacific Beach, San Ysidro, and Mission Valley.

3 Driving Without Insurance in Mexico

If your car is stolen while over the border, your US car insurance won't cover it. If you are in any way associated with an accident, your vehicle will be impounded and you will be arrested until liability is sorted out. Protect yourself by buying a policy before driving over the border.

4 Coyotes & Narcotraficantes

Coyotes, sometimes called *polleros* or chicken keepers, smuggle illegal immigrants over the border. A clampdown in

San Diego has forced the crossings into the desert, where death by heat-stroke is common. Narcotraficantes, or drug smugglers, thrive along the border with the local drug cartel.

5 Sun

Slather on the sunscreen during the day and be sure to take a hat whenever you're outdoors, especially at SeaWorld and the Zoo. California has one of the country's highest incidences of skin cancer; no surprise since people pursue outdoor activities year round.

6 High Surf

Dangerous riptides can occur along the coastal beaches; ask the lifeguards about swimming conditions at an unfamiliar beach. Posted green flags indicate safe swimming, yellow mean caution, and red flags denote hazardous surf. If you are caught in a rip-tide, don't try to swim directly to shore: let the current carry you down the coast until it dies out, and then swim in.

7 Water Contamination

Ocean waters are generally clean except after a heavy storm. Accumulated and untreated runoff from miles away washes down storm drains and empties into the ocean, and

sewer leaks are common. Especially hard-hit beaches are Imperial Beach and Border Field State Park. There are signs indicating safety levels of the water.

8 Smoking

Smoking is forbidden inside any public enclosed area, including restaurants and bars, although a few establishments have designated smoking patios. Some communities are trying to forbid smoking on streets and beaches, and the state legislature is considering a bill to ban smoking inside private cars when young children are present. It's possible to spend your entire vacation in San Diego without smelling a single cigarette.

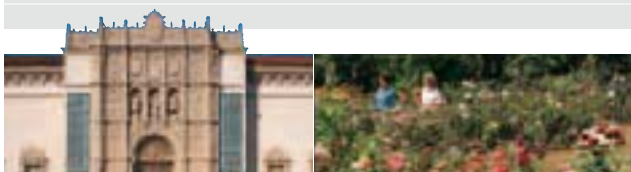
9 Panhandlers

Like any major city, San Diego has its share of panhandlers, most of whom are not aggressive. Downtown has the largest concentration, followed by the beach towns, including La Jolla.

10 Crime

San Diego is a safe city; most petty crime is limited to theft and car break-ins. Common sense prevails: don't walk around late at night; don't leave valuables inside your car; and don't give an angry salute to a driver who's deliberately cutting you off.

Top 10 Budget Tips

1 Airline Deals

When flying into Southern California, consider an open-jaw ticket, with which you can fly into Los Angeles and depart from San Diego. Two good budget airlines are Southwest Airlines and JetBlue.

2 Hotel Discounts

Discounts are offered to Auto Club members, military personnel, corporate employees, and retirees. The best on-line prices and rooms are usually on the hotel's own website. Contacting the hotel directly might find you a lower rate.

3 Free Museum Days

Every museum in Balboa Park offers free admission on one Tuesday of every month to their permanent exhibits; special traveling exhibits or programs still charge admission. The Museum of Contemporary Art in La Jolla is free on the first Sunday and third Tuesday of every month.

4 Coupons

Stop by the tourist brochure racks at hotels, restaurants, and visitor centers to pick up discount coupons for museums, SeaWorld, the Zoo, car rentals, hotels, and restaurants. Promotional coupons can often be found in Sunday papers and the *San Diego Reader* (see p104).

5 Entertainment & Attractions For Free

Unwind in Balboa Park, daydream in the lobby of Hotel del Coronado, or hang out on the Mission Beach boardwalk. Hear a free Sunday concert at the Spreckels Organ Pavilion. Check out the local talent in cafés and bars. Walkabout International organizes free daily walking tours.

6 Parking

Many hotels operate shuttles to SeaWorld and other attractions. Parking at the Zoo, Balboa Park, and Old Town is free, as well as at many trolley stops. At Horton Plaza, buy anything and receive a few hours of validated parking. At the Tijuana border, park for free on the street in front of the outlet center.

7 Gasoline

San Diego has some of the highest gas prices in the US. If you fill up in La Jolla or along the freeways, you'll be broke. Look for stations away from the coast and tourist attractions; Arco stations tend to be the lowest priced.

8 Multiple Theme Park Passes

The "Best of Balboa Park Combo" includes the Zoo and park museums for a set number of days. Other packages include variations of the Zoo,

Wild Animal Park, and SeaWorld. The "Southern California Attractions Pass" includes the three animal parks, the Disney Resort, and Knott's Berry Farm.

9 Arts Tix

Tickets for music, dance, and theater performances throughout the San Diego area are available for half price at a kiosk in front of Horton Plaza. A small service fee is charged.

10 Transportation Passes

Stop by the Transit Store to pick up a transit pass good for buses of the Metropolitan Transit System, the North County Transit District, and the San Diego Trolley. Passes are available for 1-4 days, the last half of the month, or an entire month.

10 Special Needs Tips

1 Disabled Parking

Reserved parking spaces are marked by a blue curb, a blue-and-white wheelchair logo on the pavement, and by a posted sign. You may also park with no charge at any regular parking metered area. A special disabled placard must be displayed at all times.

2 Hotels & Restaurants

Hotels with over five rooms must provide accessible accommodation to disabled guests. Always call in advance to reserve one of these rooms, and specify if you need a roll-in shower. When making restaurant reservations, do clarify that you require access.

3 Transportation

All buses, the San Diego Trolley, and the Coaster are equipped with lifts. Amtrak trains have a limited number of accessible spaces and recommend advance reservations. Greyhound provides a lift-equipped bus with advance notice. The Cloud 9 Shuttle provides transportation from the airport, also with advance notice.

4 Accessible San Diego

The excellent booklet *Access In San Diego* gives specific access information on several hotels, restaurants, and shopping centers. Also

included are tour bus companies, public and private transportation firms equipped with lifts, and car rental agencies that offer hand-controlled vehicles. You'll also find a directory of medical equipment suppliers and disability organizations.

5 Power Beach Chairs

The city of Imperial Beach provides free power beach chairs. You must bring an ID and a seat cushion, be able to get into and out of a chair, and complete a short training requirement. Advance reservations are required.

6 Ramped Curbs

Every intersection in San Diego has ramped curbs or at least a ramped driveway. Ramped access is standard in government buildings, universities, concert halls, museums, some theaters, and large hotels and restaurants.

7 Accessible Toilets

The universal wheelchair symbol indicates those restrooms that are private unisex or single occupancy with locking doors.

8 San Diego Zoo

The park map indicates walkways where you may need extra assistance if your mobility is limited or you're in a wheelchair.

Have any employee call for shuttle assistance if you need it. Regular and motorized wheelchairs are available for rent near the Clock Tower.

9 Balboa Park

Older buildings are now in compliance for disabled access. Free park trams have been equipped with wheelchair lifts, and most restrooms are wheelchair accessible. For those with special needs and with advanced arrangement, the education office of most museums can supply a staff member to escort and narrate tours.

10 Tijuana

No federal law in Mexico requires businesses to provide disabled access. Many curbs in Tijuana are ramped, but the drawback is the poor, often hazardous condition of the sidewalks. Yet, many mobility-impaired people do successfully navigate the streets.

Top 10 Security & Health

1 Consulates

Some European consuls only deal with trade issues; they do not issue passports or visas. In an emergency, contact your embassy in Washington, DC or LA. Dial 411 for assistance.

2 If You Lose Everything

Before leaving home, photocopy all important papers. If you lose your wallet, make a police report, notify your credit card companies, and notify the credit-reporting companies to prevent identity theft. You can have money wired through Western Union.

3 911

During an emergency, dial this number free from any telephone. Be prepared to specify if medical and/or police assistance is needed and your location. Call the police department for all other matters.

4 Hospitals

San Diego has some of the country's best hospitals. If your situation is not life threatening, urgent care clinics are less expensive. Call your insurance company for a referral to a local doctor or clinic.

5 Pharmacies

Sav-On Drugs and Rite-Aid have 24-hour pharmacies.

6 Helplines

If you don't have health insurance, head to a community clinic. Expect to pay on the spot for services rendered. Look in the Yellow Pages under "clinics" to find a walk-in clinic.

7 If You're in a Car Accident

Call 911 if anyone is injured. Call the police if property damage appears to be over \$500 and/or you need a police report. Drivers must exchange driver's license information and all vehicle insurance details. If you're in a rental car, report any accidents or vehicle damage to the agency immediately.

8 Seatbelts

It is California law for all passengers in the car to wear seatbelts. If not, you can be pulled over by the police and ticketed. Children under six and who weigh less than 60 lbs (27 kg) must be secured in a car safety seat. If renting a car, request the agency for a child seat in advance.

9 Public Restrooms

All major attractions have restrooms, as do gas stations and restaurants. Shopping centers, public buildings, libraries, and large hotels are other places to try. Beach restrooms are an option if you can't find a better alternative.

10 Food & Water Safety

All restaurants are required to post a letter grade, indicating the sanitation level, in their front window. An "A" means the restaurant has passed inspection; a "B" is passing, but sanitation issues exist; with a "C," a restaurant has 30 days to improve or risk closure. Water from the faucet is safe to drink but may not taste great.

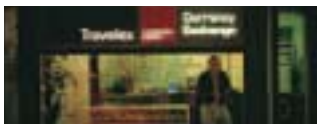

10 Banking & Communications

1 Exchange

San Diego
International Airport has international exchange kiosks in Terminal 1 and Terminal 2. Major banks handle most transactions; bring plenty of ID. Large hotels exchange currency as well, but offer low rates. Exchange windows in San Ysidro handle transactions in dollars and pesos.

2 ATMs

There are 24-hour Automatic Teller Machines all over the city. Look behind your ATM or credit card to see which banking network it's associated with. ATMs inside convenience stores or malls charge you for the convenience, as does your own bank if you go outside the network.

3 Banks

Most major banks are found throughout San Diego. Banking hours are usually 9 or 10am–6pm, Monday through Friday, with Saturday hours from 9am–1 or 2pm.

4 Traveler's Checks

Traveler's checks are good for backup in case your ATM card is swallowed. Most hotels, restaurants, and shops cash them with ID; sometimes banks charge a fee. Checks should always be in US dollars. Personal checks are difficult to cash.

5 Telephone

If using a telephone at a hotel, ask what the specific charges are first. Coin-operated pay phones can be found at hotels, some restaurants, and at gas stations, but not all of them accept incoming calls. If calling Mexico, dial 011–52 followed by the three-digit city code and seven-digit local number.

6 Phone Cards

Available all over the city, pre-paid phone cards eliminate the need for coins at public phones. Read the card before buying it; many of them charge a three-minute minimum even if you talk for less than that.

7 Internet

Cybercafés are not as common in the US as other countries. The San Diego Public Library offers Internet access, as do hostels. The San Diego Internet Café supplies coffee while surfing. Lestat's Coffeehouse (see p56) and the Gelato Vero Caffè offer free wireless access.

8 Post Offices

Regular post office hours are 8:30am–5pm Mon–Fri, with some branches open on Saturday mornings. Stamps are usually available from vending machines in the lobby, and signage indicates the cost of postage for mail

sent to domestic and international addresses. Hotel concierges can post mail for you.

9 Shipping

Franchised United Parcel Service stores throughout the city will package and ship for you. Regular parcel post at the post office is the cheapest, and some branches sell boxes and tape. Packages shipped internationally can take over a month for delivery.

10 Courier Services

Federal Express and UPS have guaranteed overnight delivery and reliable international service. Many offices sell packaging supplies. Much cheaper, the US Postal Service offers overnight service in the continental US and two-three day service internationally.

TOP 10 Shopping Tips

1 Bargaining in Mexico

Bargaining is an ancient art and social exchange in Mexico. The rule of thumb is to offer half the asking price and work up from there. If the vendor senses you really want an item, he or she will stand firm. Remain polite and remember the vendor needs to earn a living. Department stores, upscale shops, and restaurants all have fixed prices.

2 Kobey's Swap Meet

Wear comfortable shoes, bring cash, and come early to walk the 21 aisles of this enormous outdoor flea market. Merchants sell clothing, plants, jewelry, luggage, electronics, sporting goods, and much more. Always ask sellers: "Is that your best price?"

3 Shopping Malls

The best shopping mall bargains can be found around public holidays. Department stores sometimes bring in outside merchandise to sell at "bargain" prices. Malls with concierge services sometimes have discount booklets.

4 Outlet Centers

San Diego has three outlet centers within an hour's driving distance: the Carlsbad Company Stores in North County,

the Shops at Las Americas at San Ysidro, and Viejas on the Viejas Indian Reservation east on I-8. You can usually find good deals at the designer spin-off shops.

5 Garage Sales

To meet San Diegans, drive around residential areas on any given Saturday and you'll find them selling items in their driveways. To locate garage sales, look for signs posted on telephone poles or find a copy of the *Pennysaver*, which lists addresses.

6 Senior Discounts

Senior discounts are offered at movie halls, restaurants, hotels, and shops. Some theater chains deem senior status at age 55, and many retail stores designate a certain day of the week for senior discounts. Use your AARP (American Association of Retired Persons) card when booking hotels.

7 Taxes

Current sales tax in San Diego is 7.75 percent. A non-refundable sales tax is added to all retail purchases and restaurant checks. Food items in grocery stores are not taxed unless they are for immediate consumption. If a store is shipping your purchase to an out-of-state address, you shouldn't

pay sales tax. Hotel tax is 10.5 percent.

8 Shopping Hours

Retail shops usually open at 10am and close from 5–6pm. Regular hours at shopping malls are 10am–9pm Mon–Sat and 11am–7pm Sun. Department stores sometimes open at 7am for super sales or extend their hours during the Christmas season. Malls close only during a few major holidays.

9 Open 24 Hours

You shouldn't have any trouble finding a 24-hour convenience store selling groceries. Many Ralph's and Albertson's supermarkets are open all night. A 24-hour Sav-On Drugstore (see p110) has grocery items, and some office supplies can be found at Kinko's.

10 Returns

Most stores accept returns, unless the item was bought on sale. Stores usually post their returns policy in a prominent place. Many accept returns for in-store credit only.

10 Eating & Accommodation Tips

1 Farmers' Markets

Local farmers sell fresh vegetables, fruit, and specialties such as tamales, cheese and bread at special markets around the city. Seasonal produce is usually of much better quality and price than at the super-market. Take a supply of single dollar bills to make quick purchases.

2 Lunches & Early Bird Dinners

Entrées on the lunch menu are often half the price of those at dinner. Some restaurants offer early-bird dinners from 4–6pm, with a limited number of entrées at a considerable discount.

3 Picnics

Make the most of San Diego's beautiful parks and beaches. Get items to go from restaurants, or stop by markets such as Trader Joe's (see p99) in Pacific Beach to pick up salads, sushi, and deli items.

4 Tipping

Most food servers expect a 15–20 percent tip; leave it in cash or add it to your credit card bill. If the service is truly awful, you're not obliged to tip. With large parties, 18 percent gratuity is automatically added to the check.

5 Alcohol Age Limit

The legal drinking age in California is 21.

If you look under 30, restaurant servers and merchants selling alcohol will ask to see your photo identification. In Tijuana, the legal drinking age is 18.

6 Fast Food

Fast food restaurants are the cheapest way to eat, are easily found, and many are open all night. San Diego is the birthplace to two fast food chains, Rubio's and Jack-in-the-Box.

7 Happy Hours

Many restaurants and bars offer happy hours on weekdays. For the price of a drink and a few dollars, snack on anything from a hot buffet to chips and dip. Some Mexican restaurants sell cheap tacos on "Taco Tuesdays." Check out the advertisements in the *San Diego Reader* (see p104)

8 Motel Chains

Staying at a motel chain offers standardized accommodation. Most major chains can be found in Mission Valley's Hotel Circle. Parking is generally free, breakfast is often supplied, and you aren't charged countless petty fees.

9 Apartments & Extended Stay

If you plan to stay in San Diego for more than a few weeks, consider renting an apartment.

Summer rentals, especially along the beach, are more costly. Always ask what amenities are included.

10 Camping

The only comfortable place to camp legally near the city is in Chula Vista. The well-located campground offers a swimming pool, hot tub, and bicycle rentals. If desperate, try sleeping at the airport, or rent a cheap car and sleep in a motel parking lot. RV owners can try Campland on the Bay, who also accept tent campers.

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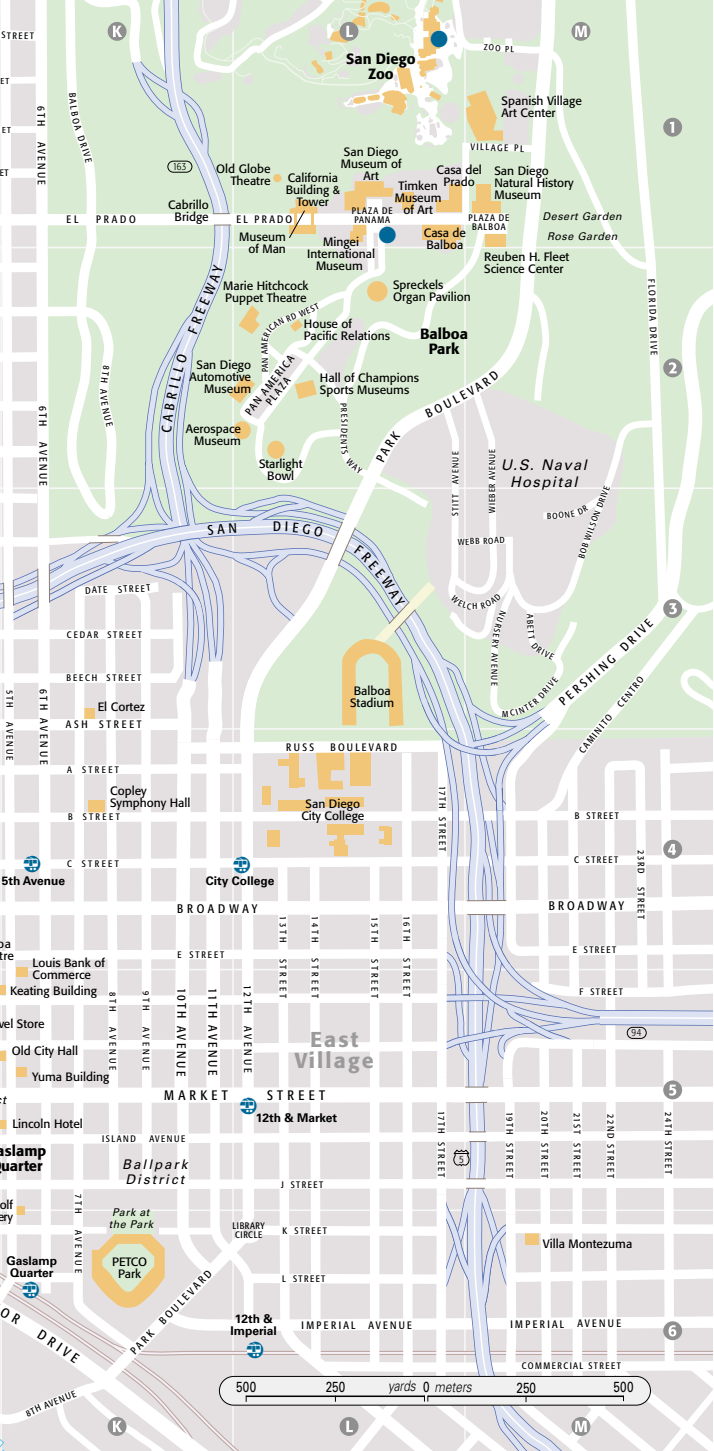


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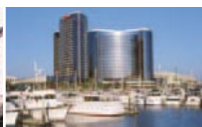






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
